

## Motorcyclists Rights Lobbyist Update: Bills

## Senate Bill 92 Umberg (D - Anaheim) Courts: remote proceedings for criminal cases

This bill would provide that, in a misdemeanor, if the accused agrees, the initial court appearance, arraignment, plea, and all other proceedings, except jury and court trials, may be conducted remotely through the use of technology. This would make it easier to fight excessive and targeted noise and motorcycle tickets. \*SUPPORT\*

## Senate Bill 961 Wiener (D - San Francisco) Vehicles: safety equipment speed limiter

This bill would require certain vehicles, commencing with the 2027 model year, to be equipped with an intelligent speed limiter, as specified, that would limit the speed of the vehicle to 10 miles per hour over the speed limit. The bill would exempt emergency vehicles from this requirement and would authorize the Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol to authorize the disabling of the system on other vehicles based on specified criteria. \*\*\*OPPOSE\*\*\*

## Senate Bill 1297 Allen (D - Santa Monica) Speed safety system pilot program

Existing law authorizes, until January 1, 2032, specified cities and the City and County of San Francisco to establish a local speed safety system pilot program, operated in certain types of streets and school zones, to detect speed violations by using an electronic speed safety system, as defined. Pursuant to the pilot program, a designated jurisdiction participating within the pilot program with a population of less than 300,000, as determined by the United States Census Bureau in the 2020 Census, is authorized to operate no more than 9 speed safety systems.

This bill would instead authorize a designated jurisdiction participating within the pilot program with a population of less than 300,000, as determined, to operate no more than 12 speed safety systems. \*\*\*OPPOSE\*\*\*

## Assembly Bill 2392 Soria (D - Merced/Fresno) Vehicles: motorcycle: safety helmet exception

This bill would exempt from this requirement a person who wears a turban or patka as an expression of the person's religious belief and practice when riding on a motorcycle, motor-driven cycle, or motorized bicycle. TRACKING

## Assembly Bill 3102 Hoover (R - Folsom) Vehicles: motorcycle license

This bill would authorize the operator of a motorcyclist training program described above to issue a certificate of satisfactory completion to a person at least 21 years of age who has opted to complete only the skills testing portion of the training program and has successfully passed the skills test. The bill would require the motorcyclist training program operator to, in a manner prescribed by the Department of Motor Vehicles, note on the certificate that the person has completed only the skills testing portion of the program. The bill would authorize the department to accept a certificate issued pursuant to these provisions from an applicant who is at least 21 years of age in lieu of a driving test for a motorcycle driver's license if the applicant has met the other examination requirements for the license for which the applicant is applying. \*SUPPORT\*

Check monthly on our Motorcyclists Rights Lobbyist Update: Bills, on page 3 for the many other bill we are Supporting and Opposing.



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

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








## Message from the Executive Director

Happy April to all our ABATE members and to all motorcycle enthusiasts who may be reading this month's edition.

April stems from the Latin word "aperio", meaning to open. It signifies spring and the budding of plants. We,

however, look at it as finally having some decent riding weather. If you have not been riding much over the last couple of months (and likely due to the significant rain California has received) make sure to do a once-over of your bike. Check air pressures, fluid levels and that all of your lights are working. The Bailing Wire Team has brought back the monthly Motorcycle Safety Article. A BIG thanks to Ratchet Ron for a fine article!

Some of the things to look forward to this month, starting April 13, is the second quarter board meeting. This meeting will be a hybrid meeting, meeting online and a TBD physical location.

Legislative Issues to be on the look-out for include:

SB 961 Motor vehicle speed limiters – the Federal Government is ready to take more of your individual rights away. This time by forcing automobile manufacturers to install speed limiters into your vehicles. This is basically a speed governor. The opportunities for abuse are huge and unknown. Stand with ABATE when we oppose this legislation.

AB-645 Vehicles: speed safety system pilot program. This bill is in a pilot program. It has been rolled out to a few cities within California. The goal is to modify red light cameras with equipment to also monitor and ticket vehicles who are violating city speed limits. When the red-light cameras came out many citizens complained to their local Legislators and were able to get them removed. Concerns were around the legality of contracting with an outside agency to install and issue the citations, as well as the fact that they get a cut from each ticket. ABATE was able to push the bill into a pilot program when we challenged how the state will fund the project. Work with your ABATE Local to help us stop this bill.

HR 906, the REPAIR Act. Again, big brother wants to make sure that you can no longer perform your own vehicle service and repair. This bill only supports the Automobile Industry as it forces you to go to a service shop to maintain your vehicle. The obvious result of this will be higher service fees.

2024 California Motorcycle Anti-Profiling Bill. This is an ongoing issue which ABATE and many other motorcycling rights groups are supporting. Take the motorcycling profiling survey, even if you don't think that you have been profiled. The database covers past years, and the questions may make you realize that you really have been profiled by law enforcement, as it starts with you simply being pulled over.

Communicate Motorcycle Charity Events. One of the things that we should be doing a better job at is communicating the fact that motorcyclists support charities through their ride events. This brings out the humanitarian side of what we do. If you attend one of these

events, communicate it to us, either directly or through your Local Reports

The A.B.A.T.E. Story on YouTube @ RustyCoonesChannel. Rusty Coones put together a fantastic video communicating the history and the mission of ABATE of California. Go to YouTube and search the title of this section and then share it out far and wide.

## Legislative Director's News

#### Making Your Voice Heard in the California State Legislature

#### PART III IN A III-PART SERIES

REMINDER: THERE ARE MULTIPLE WAYS TO INTRODUCE YOURSELF AND ESTABLISH A RELATIONSHIP. THE GOOD NEWS IS, IT REALLY DOESN'T TAKE THAT MUCH TIME OUT OF YOUR LIFE AND THE BENEFITS ARE MANY. ALTHOUGH THERE IS MUCH DEBATE REGARDING THE USE OF LETTERS AND PHONE CALLS, THEY ARE STILL LOW-COST, MINIMUM EFFORT OPTIONS. HOWEVER, THE FACE TO FACE METHOD IS IDEAL.

WHEN MEETING WITH ELECTED OFFICIALS

IDENTIFY YOUR LEGISLATOR(S):

California is divided into assembly and senate districts. The essayist way to determine who your legislators is to use the below link.

#### https://findyourrep.legislature.ca.gov/

Each bill is generally heard (debated) and voted on at least four times before passing the Legislature – first by the policy committees and then by the full membership of each house. If the bill has a fiscal impact, it is required to be heard first in a fiscal committee before going to either the Assembly or the Senate floor. Each committee and floor vote provides an opportunity to present your input through a letter, phone call or meeting, but is also an opportunity for bills to be amended. Therefore, it is important that you stay current on the bill's status.

Signing up with the California Legislative Information facility the best way to keep current on bills at each step in the legislative process. Once you register using your email address, you can track any bill using the (Track Bill) link at the top of the page as you view the bill you wish to track. As a bill gets updated, you will receive an email. You can manage your subscriptions (bills you are tracking) and any Favorites by using the (My Subscriptions) and (My Favorites) tabs at the top of the page.

Newsletters and the media are also very helpful sources for keeping current on a particular piece of legislation. There are also official legislative publications when can be obtain in public libraries, legislator's offices, the Capitol Bill Room and on the Internet.

ASSEMBLY (OR SENATE)
DAILY FILE:
Printed each day the
Legislature is in session, the Daily File includes a listing of bills set for hearing in committee

and bills to be voted on by the Assembly or Senate.

ASSEMBLY (OR SENATE) WEEKLY HISTORY: The Weekly Histories indicate the status of each piece of Legislation.

ASSEMBLY (OR SENATE) DAILY JOURNAL: The Daily Journal is the official record of proceedings on the Assembly or Senate Floor.

LEGISLATIVE INDEX: The Index contains a complete listing, by subject matter, of all bills introduced. You may also want to contact your legislator's district office to receive an update on the status of legislation.

ASSEMBLY AND SENATE ONLINE HOMEPAGE: All the above and more can be found on the Assembly Homepage at www. assembly.ca.gov and Senate Homepage at www.senate.ca.gov.

Although communicating directly with your elected officials is one of the most effective methods of making your voice heard, there are other indirect ways to raise their awareness of issues that are important to you. You can write an op-ed (guest editorial); send a letter to the editor of a local paper, start a blog or comment on one. You can also use social media to communicate your idea.

Media editors often appreciate receiving well-written opinion pieces. Legislators and their staff pay attention to these pieces, especially ones which appear in their local newspapers.

HOW TO WRITE AN EDITORIAL OR LETTER TO THE EDITOR

GET TO THE POINT: Your first paragraph should concisely summarize the main point of your letter.

ESTABLISH YOUR CREDIBILITY AND WRITE ABOUT WHAT YOU KNOW: Your commentary should speak with some authority. This authority is established by

stating your expertise or personal experience with the issue. Your education, years of work experience, affiliations or official position are important facts that should be included in your letter to help establish your credibility.

BE BRIEF: A letter to the editor should be fewer than 200 words, and an op-ed no more than 600 – 700 words.

LOOK FOR A "HOOK": Editors are more likely to publish your letter or op-ed if you refer to a current issue. Letters to the editor should always be responding to a recent news article.

TAKE A POSITION: Your goal is to present a particular position and not simply to "report" on an issue. Provide evidence that supports your position.

TRY TO MAKE PERSONAL CONTACT: Call the paper and ask for the name of the person who reviews letters and op-eds from the public. Call that person a few days after you send your letter or article and ask whether the paper will print it.

One of the most efficient and convenient methods of contacting your legislator is using your computer to access the California Assemble and Senate web pages at www. assembly.ca.gov and www.senate.ca.gov. At these sites, you will find a wealth of information about your State Legislature, its day-to-day activities, legislation and your representative. Additionally, you can:

- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$  Communicate with your legislators by email.
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$  Get information about past and present bills.
- · Create a personal "Subscribe List" (similar to the California Legislative Bills website) and automatically receive free bill updates via email.

If you're interested in keeping track of specific legislation, here is an easy way to create a personal "Subscription List" and automatically receive free email updates on bill changes.

This concludes this month's Sporty Rides and Polar Bear wrap up. Look for pictures of the run in this edition of the Bailing Wire.



- Type in the bill author, number or subject; click "Search".
- · Click "Track Bill" when bill information is displayed.
- · Register or enter Login.
- · Enter your email address; click "OK."
- · Choose notification options and click the "Add Notifications" button.

#### LET YOUR VIEWS BE KNOWN

If you want to send an email to your legislator:

- · Locate your legislator's contact page under "Members."
- · Write a short letter (one page if possible) in a clear and concise manner.
- · Identify measures by bill number and indicate your opposition or support.
  - · Close with a request for more information.
- · Always include your full name, home address and telephone number.

IDENTIFYING TYPES OF STATE LEGISLATION: Different types of legislation require different vote majorities to pass.

#### ASSEMBLY OR SENATE BILL

An Assembly Bill (AB) or Senate Bill (SB), the most common type of legislation, proposes change to current laws or enact new ones. These bills require a majority vote (41 in the Assembly, 21 in the Senate), unless the bills contain a general fund appropriation or an urgency clause, in which case they require a two-thirds vote for passage. All bills that amend the Political Reform Act also require a two-thirds vote.

All bills passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor take effect on January 1 of the following year, unless the legislation specifies otherwise or the measure contains an urgency clause, in which case the measure takes effect immediately upon receiving the Governor's signature.

#### ASSEMBLY OR SENATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

An Assembly Constitutional Amendment (ACA) or Senate Constitutional Amendment (SCA) proposes a change to the State Constitution. All constitutional amendments require a two-thirds vote of the Legislature; they are then placed on the ballot of the next statewide general election, unless otherwise stated, where they must receive a majority vote of the people before they are enacted into law. ACAs and SCAs do not require the signature of the Governor's.

#### ASSEMBLY OR SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

An Assembly Concurrent Resolution (ACR) or Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) is used to adopt joint rules, create joint committees or direct executive departments of state government to provide information to the Legislature. A majority vote of both houses is required. Resolutions do not require the signature of the Governor, nor do they have the force of law.

An Assembly Joint Resolution (AJR) or Senate Joint Resolution (SJR) is used to convey the position of the Legislature on a particular issue. A majority vote of both houses is required. The signature of the Governor is not required.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION

A House Resolution (HR) amends the rules of the Legislature, requests the creation of committees or requires that a particular action be taken by a committee. A majority vote by the house of origin is

Don't overlook the importance of giving your bike a quick wipe down before it sees the road, as during that wipe down, you may notice a low tire or loose bolt or free cable. Lots of things can be revealed just from giving the bike a quick wipe down.

Safety is more than just making sure your ride is ready for the road. You also need to get yourself ready for what lays ahead of you. Take a moment to make sure you've got your guardian angels, and you are listening to what they have to say.

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
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## **Locals Reports**

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# Automakers wary of other states adopting California's 2035 EV mandate

## They say the plan might be feasible 'at least in the early years for California'

WASHINGTON — Major automakers said on Wednesday that a California plan to end the sale of gasoline-only vehicles by 2035 might be unworkable in 11 other states that adopted it, citing insufficient consumer demand.

The Alliance for Automotive Innovation, which represents most major automakers except Tesla, raised concerns in comments filed with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on California's proposal.

The California Air Resources Board (CARB) asked the EPA for a waiver under the Clean Air Act to implement its plan to end sales of gasoline-only vehicles by 2035.

California's EV requirements might be feasible "at least in the early years for California" but said the feasibility for other states with significantly lower current EV sales "is far less certain," the auto industry group said.

The onus for complying with the rules rests with automakers but it is unclear "whether customers in each jurisdiction will accept (zero-emission vehicle) technologies and purchase them in sufficient quantities. These are largely beyond the control of automakers," the group that represents General Motors, Toyota, Volkswagen and others said.

CARB said in response: "States that have adopted California's program understand that clean cars improve public health and address a global challenge."

AAI said that in order to meet the 2035 goal sales of electric, plugin electric hybrid or hydrogen fuel cell vehicles will need to more than double in all but one state adopting California's rules and triple in five.

EPA did not immediately comment.

Separately, the American Petroleum Institute, an industry group, urged EPA to reject California's plan, which it said represents "the ultimate regulatory intervention."

President Joe Biden's administration has avoided setting a date to phase out the sale of gasoline-only vehicles.


The EPA in April separately proposed rules to cut vehicle emissions through 2032, forecasting that 60% of new cars produced by automakers would need to be EVs by 2030 and 67% by 2032 to meet requirements. Reuters reported this month the EPA plans to soften yearly requirements through 2030.


California's rules start in the 2026 model year and would cut smog-causing pollution from light-duty vehicles by 25% by 2037. They mandate 35% of new cars sold must be electric or plug-in hybrid by 2026. That proportion will rise to 68% by 2030 and 100% by 2035.

California's rules require by 2035 that 80% of all new vehicles sold in the state be electric and no more than 20% plug-in hybrid electric.


Chrysler parent Stellantis said in December it would temporarily cut one shift at its Detroit assembly plant that builds Jeep sport utility vehicles, citing California EV regulations.



Publicity Coordinator, and Jodie Maxwell, our website coordinator. Their contact info is listed in the front of this Bailing Wire.



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## Speed Cameras Fact Sheet

## **Speed Cameras Fact Sheet**

With properly posted speed limits and properly installed traffic-control devices, there is no need for ticket cameras. They can actually make our roads less safe. Here are ten reasons to oppose speed cameras:

#### 1) Photo radar is still radar, and it can generate false readings.

Radar is not perfect. Unlike other normal tickets, citations resulting from cameras do not have a tracking history or a visual estimation by a qualified officer to back them up. Thousands of tickets can be generated between routine maintenance and calibration inspections, potentially resulting in just as many faulty readings.

#### 2) This type of enforcement emphasizes ticket volume.

Despite claims to the contrary, photo radar is used in locations characterized by high traffic volume and under-posted speed limits. It is not profitable to use photo radar on residential streets, low volume roads or where speed limits are posted at the 85th percentile (the speed at which they should be posted).

#### 3) Ticket cameras are very inaccurate on certain roads.

Tests done by the University of Virginia found that fewer than three percent of the photos taken of vehicles on Interstate-type roads provided a clear image of a single vehicle, the license plate number and the driver. Photo radar should not be used on high-speed, multi-lane highways. Yet, some greedy cities still use it on these types of roads.

#### 4) Photo radar encourages artificially low speed limits.

In areas where proper speed limits have been set according to the 85th percentile (the speed at or below which 85 percent of traffic is flowing), cameras could only make money if their tolerance threshold was very low, such as one or two miles per hour over the speed limit. Politically, this is not acceptable, nor will the courts support this kind of enforcement. The only option is to put the photo radar on roads with unreasonably low speed limits, and then make sure the limits stay low.

#### 5) Ticket cameras do not improve safety.

Despite the claims of companies that sell ticket cameras and provide related services, there is no independent verification that photo enforcement devices improve highway safety, reduce overall accidents, or improve traffic flow. Believing the claims of companies that sell photo enforcement equipment or municipalities that use this equipment is like believing any commercial produced by a company that is trying to sell you something.

#### 6) There is no certifiable witness to the alleged violation.

A picture may be worth a thousand words, but it may also take a thousand words to explain what the picture really means. Even in those rare instances where a law enforcement officer is overseeing a ticket camera, it is highly unlikely that the officer would recall the supposed violation. For all practical purposes, there is no "accuser" for motorists to confront, which is a constitutional right. There is no one that can personally testify to the circumstances of the alleged violation, and just because a camera unit was operating properly when it was set up does not mean it was operating properly when the picture was taken of any given vehicle.

#### 7) Ticket recipients are not adequately notified.

Most governments using ticket cameras send out tickets via first class mail. There is no guarantee that the accused motorists will even receive the ticket, let alone understands it and know how to respond. However, the government makes the assumption that the ticket was received. If motorists fail to pay, it is assumed that they did so on purpose, and a warrant may be issued for their arrest.

#### 8) The driver of the vehicle is not positively identified.


Typically, the photos taken by these cameras do not identify the driver of the offending vehicle. The owner of the vehicle is mailed the ticket, even if the owner was not driving the vehicle and may not know who was driving at the time. The owner of the vehicle is then forced to prove his or her innocence, often by identifying the actual diver who may be a family member, friend or employee.

#### 9) Ticket recipients are not notified quickly.

People may not receive citations until days or sometimes weeks after the alleged violation. This makes it very difficult to defend oneself because it would be hard to remember the circumstances surrounding the supposed violation. There may have been a reason that someone would be speeding or in an intersection after the light turned red. Even if the photo was taken in error, it may be very hard to recall the day in question.

#### ${f 10})$ Ticket camera systems are designed to inconvenience motorists.

Under the guise of protecting motorist privacy, the court or private contractor that sends out tickets often refuses to send a copy of the photo to the accused vehicle owner. This is really because many of the photos do not clearly depict the driver or the driver is obviously not the vehicle owner. Typically, the vehicle owner is forced to travel to a courthouse or municipal building to even see the photograph, an obvious and deliberate inconvenience meant to discourage ticket challenges.
