Safety Corner with Ratchet Ron



Safety Tips: Before you hit the road, make sure you check all your lights, turn signals, brake light, high beam, and low beam, as these features alert other drivers of your intentions.

"Hot tempers cause arguments,

but patience brings peace."

-Proverbs 15:18

Riding in heavy traffic either in town or on the interstate brings some of the most stressful challenges. Riding safe requires riders to stay focused, remain calm and positive, and most of all ... be patient. Remaining patient in traffic is one of the best safety strategies we can use.

There are several other things we can do to ride safely in traffic. Riders must make themselves visible to all drivers. So, using turn signals and engaging the brake light while

slowing is always good. You can also use your altered exhaust as a horn.

Also remember to stay out of a car's blindspot. When traveling on 2-lane streets and highways, the right lane usually offers more escape routes than the left. Oncoming traffic can hurt you more than the pavement.

My wife was commuting home one night from work on a two-lane transition road between the interstates and she heard a bike coming behind her. She was traveling in the right lane, in stop and go traffic, so she merged to the right to give the most room between the cars for a bike to come down between the cars. The problem was the bike was coming down the emergency lane on the right side. Nothing happened, but the emergency lane is quite often where the garbage and trash, bolts and glass are. And not a legal lane to travel in. So, avoid

being harassed by revenue-collectors and be patient.

We all get frustrated with California's so called "freeways," but let's make it to our destination safely. Be patient. Everyone is trying to get somewhere too, and they are not always patient. As bikers, we need to be alert to what is happening around us and use an extra dose of patience.

Motorcyclists Rights Lobbyist Update: Bills

Presented by The Lombardo Group, ABATE Lobbyist

Senate Bill 92 Umberg (D - Anaheim) Courts: remote proceedings for criminal cases (Passed to Assembly)

This bill would provide that, in a misdemeanor, if the accused agrees, the initial court appearance, arraignment, plea, and all other proceedings, except jury and court trials, may be conducted remotely through the use of technology. This would make it easier to fight excessive and targeted noise and motorcycle tickets. *SUPPORT*

Senate Bill 961 Wiener (D - San Francisco) Vehicles: safety equipment speed limiter (Amended, Passed)

A "passive intelligent speed assistance system" means an integrated vehicle system that uses, at minimum, the GPS location of the vehicle compared with a database of posted speed limits, to determine the speed limit, and utilizes visual and audio signals to alert the driver while they are exceeding the speed limit by more than five miles per hour. If an intelligent speed assistance system receives conflicting speed limits for the same area, the system shall utilize the higher speed limit.

Commencing with the 2029 model year, 50 percent of passenger vehicles, motortrucks, and buses manufactured or sold in the state shall be equipped with a passive intelligent speed assistance system.

Commencing with the 2032 model year, every passenger vehicle, motortruck, and bus manufactured or sold in the state shall be equipped with a passive intelligent speed assistance system.

OPPOSE

Senate Bill 1297 Allen (D - Santa Monica) Speed safety system pilot program (Passed to Fiscal Committee)

This bill would authorize, until January 1, 2032, the City of Malibu to establish a similar speed camera program, signed into Law last year, for speed enforcement that utilizes up to 5 speed safety systems on the Pacific Coast Highway. This bill would require the City of Malibu to also

implement the above provisions if it establishes the speed safety system program on the Pacific Coast Highway. This bill would require a \$25 filing fee for an appeal challenging a notice of violation issued as a result of the City of Malibu's speed safety system program until January 1, 2032. ***OPPOSE***

Assembly Bill 2392 Soria (D - Merced/Fresno) Vehicles: motorcycle: safety helmet exception (Passed)

This bill would exempt from this requirement a person who wears a turban or patka as an expression of the person's religious belief and practice when riding on a motorcycle, motor-driven cycle, or motorized bicycle. TRACKING

Assembly Bill 3102 Hoover (R - Folsom) Vehicles: motorcycle license (Passed to Fiscal Committee)

This bill would authorize the operator of a motorcyclist training program described above to issue a certificate of satisfactory completion to a person at least 21 years of age who has opted to complete only the skills testing portion of the training program and has successfully passed the skills test. The bill would require the motorcyclist training program operator to, in a manner prescribed by the Department of Motor Vehicles, note on the certificate that the person has completed only the skills testing portion of the program. The bill would authorize the department to accept a certificate issued pursuant to these provisions from an applicant who is at least 21 years of age in lieu of a driving test for a motorcycle driver's license if the applicant has met the other examination requirements for the license for which the applicant is applying. *SUPPORT*

April was the Deadline to pass Bills out of Policy Committees. We were successful in passing Assembly Bill 3102 Hoover out of Assembly Transportation Committee and now awaits action in the Assembly Appropriations Committee. It most likely will be sent to the dreaded Suspense file, as over 95% of the Bills heard in Appropriations are sent! We will battle Staff and Leadership to get it out in late May when there is a One Day hearing on over 1000 proposed Laws!


The other big bill we are battling is Senate Bill 961 Wiener, which will require all New Vehicles sold in California to include SPEED Governors to limit the Vehicles capabilities. We are part of a Coalition which includes SEMA, California Trucking Association and others opposing! At the last-minute amendments are being submitted to get the bill out of Senate Transportation Committee – We will continue to Oppose the bill but most likely have to "kill" it in the Assembly.

May is Motorcycle Awareness Month and for the 20th Consecutive year the Caltrans Message Boards will be Posting Look out for MOTORCYCLISTS! Another Victory.

Stay Tuned...Another busy Year in Sacramento.













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
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

Legislative Director's News

Another important way to make your voice heard is using the Legislature Position Letter Portal

ABATE periodically

asks our members and the general public to contact their local legislators to support or oppose legislative bills for a given legislative session initiated by a Call-To-Action notice and use of a software tool which uses address information to identify district legislators and email them a scripted request for action letter or provide an option for constituents to type their own message. This process has been a staple in every Motorcycle Rights Organization toolkit and an important one to communicate to legislators what their constituents feel are important and to request their support or opposistion to a piece of legislation. This support or opposition can come in the form of informal inquiries and discussions between legislators regarding the bill in question or voting for or against the bill when it comes to a floor vote.

The limitation of this process doesn't completely address the desire to influence the fate of a bill during its journey through the various legislative committees before going to the floor for a vote. We in ABATE are charged with identifying bills that impact our rights and lifestyle and working to either help move a bill along the process, successfully get the bill passed/enacted or stopping it dead in its tracks as soon as reasonably possible.

To this end, there is a way for constituents and ABATE members to proactively make a difference as bills go through the various committees using the state's online Position Letter Portal. This facility allows you as an individual to send your thoughts for or against a bill directly to the chair/members of a given committee based on current assignment and when the hearing is scheduled when you submit your input. The portal tracks the committees when a bill is assigned to and ensure your position input goes to the members of the assigned committee at the time of your submission without having to know which committee the bill is scheduled for or the members of that given committee.

In order to use this facility, you have to register yourself and obtain a password. This is a one-time thing. Then, when ABATE requests members to send input, all one has to do is login and cut/paste either the scripted message we provide, upload a word version of the message from your PC/Laptop/Phone or enter your own support or opposition position message manually.

Use the below QR Code to access the Portal Home Page. Instructions on how to get started and additional help can be found there.



Constituents and ABATE members should open an "Individual" Account. Below are the basics.

Individual Accounts

Submitting Notes or Position Letter

- 1. Select measure type, enter measure number and select Session Type.
- 2. Click the Search button.
- 3. Select the appropriate Committee and Stance.
- 4. Paste the scripted message provided by ABATE or type your own note message in the note box. If you have a drafted letter on your PC, select

Submit a letter instead checkbox to upload your letter.

- 5. If you check to Submit a Letter and pop up appears asking Do you wish to represent an organization? Select No.
 - 6. Select Submit to send the letter.


Edit Account option for Individuals.

1. Select the Edit Account button from the top-right navigation menu. Modify account information and select Submit.

Change Password

- 1. Click Change password link.
- 2. Input the Old password.
- 3. Input the New Password twice and select Change Password.



Speed Cameras

Speed Cameras Fact Sheet

With properly posted speed limits and properly installed traffic-control devices, there is no need for ticket cameras. They can actually make our roads less safe. Here are ten reasons to oppose speed cameras:

1) Photo radar is still radar, and it can generate false readings.

Radar is not perfect. Unlike other normal tickets, citations resulting from cameras do not have a tracking history or a visual estimation by a qualified officer to back them up. Thousands of tickets can be generated between routine maintenance and calibration inspections, potentially resulting in just as many faulty readings.

2) This type of enforcement emphasizes ticket volume.

Despite claims to the contrary, photo radar is used in locations characterized by high traffic volume and under-posted speed limits. It is not profitable to use photo radar on residential streets, low volume roads or where speed limits are posted at the 85th percentile (the speed at which they should be posted).

3) Ticket cameras are very inaccurate on certain roads.

Tests done by the University of Virginia found that fewer than three percent of the photos taken of vehicles on Interstate-type roads provided a clear image of a single vehicle, the license plate number and the driver. Photo radar should not be used on high-speed, multi-lane highways. Yet, some greedy cities still use it on these types of roads.

4) Photo radar encourages artificially low speed limits.

In areas where proper speed limits have been set according to the 85th percentile (the speed at or below which 85 percent of traffic is flowing), cameras could only make money if their tolerance threshold was very low, such as one or two miles per hour over the speed limit. Politically, this is not acceptable, nor will the courts support this kind of enforcement. The only option is to put the photo radar on roads with unreasonably low speed limits, and then make sure the limits stay low.

5) Ticket cameras do not improve safety.

Despite the claims of companies that sell ticket cameras and provide related services, there is no independent verification that photo enforcement devices improve highway safety, reduce overall accidents, or improve traffic flow. Believing the claims of companies that sell photo enforcement equipment or municipalities that use this equipment is like believing any commercial produced by a company that is trying to sell you something.

6) There is no certifiable witness to the alleged violation.

A picture may be worth a thousand words, but it may also take a thousand words to explain what the picture really means. Even in those rare instances where a law enforcement officer is overseeing a ticket camera, it is highly unlikely that the officer would recall the supposed violation. For all practical purposes, there is no "accuser" for motorists to confront, which is a constitutional right. There is no one that can personally testify to the circumstances of the alleged violation, and just because a camera unit was operating properly when it was set up does not mean it was operating properly when the picture was taken of any given vehicle.

7) Ticket recipients are not adequately notified.

Most governments using ticket cameras send out tickets via first class mail. There is no guarantee that the accused motorists will even receive the ticket, let alone understands it and know how to respond. However, the government makes the assumption that the ticket was received. If motorists fail to pay, it is assumed that they did so on purpose, and a warrant may be issued for their arrest.

8) The driver of the vehicle is not positively identified.

Typically, the photos taken by these cameras do not identify the driver of the offending vehicle. The owner of the vehicle is mailed the ticket, even if the owner was not driving the vehicle and may not know who was driving at the time. The owner of the vehicle is then forced to prove his or her innocence, often by identifying the actual diver who may be a family member, friend or employee.

9) Ticket recipients are not notified quickly.

People may not receive citations until days or sometimes weeks after the alleged violation. This makes it very difficult to defend oneself because it would be hard to remember the circumstances surrounding the supposed violation. There may have been a reason that someone would be speeding or in an intersection after the light turned red. Even if the photo was taken in error, it may be very hard to recall the day in question.

10) Ticket camera systems are designed to inconvenience motorists.

Under the guise of protecting motorist privacy, the court or private contractor that sends out tickets often refuses to send a copy of the photo to the accused vehicle owner. This is really because many of the photos do not clearly depict the driver or the driver is obviously not the vehicle owner. Typically, the vehicle owner is forced to travel to a courthouse or municipal building to even see the photograph, an obvious and deliberate inconvenience meant to discourage ticket challenges.

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

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


Locals Reports

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
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
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



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


















Membership Chair Report

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
