

# Bills At A Glance

<u>AB 43 Friedman (D – Glendale, Chair of Assembly Transportation). Traffic safety</u>: This bill would require, beginning June 1, 2022, and every 6 months thereafter, Caltrans to convene a committee of external design experts to advise on revisions to the Highway Design Manual. This bill would extend the period of time a prima facie speed limit may be justified by an engineering and traffic survey, as specified, if a registered engineer evaluates the section of the highway and finds that there has been an increase in traffic-related crashes. (TRACKING/MEETINGS WITH STAKEHOLDERS) \*In Senate, Committee on Rules Pending Referral

<u>AB 122 Boerner Horvath (D – Oceanside) Vehicles: required stops: bicycles</u>: This bill would require a person riding a bicycle, when approaching a stop sign at the entrance of an intersection, to yield the right-of-way to any vehicles that have stopped at the entrance of the intersection, have entered the intersection, or that are approaching on the intersecting highway close enough to constitute an immediate hazard, and shall continue to yield the right-of-way to those vehicles until reasonably safe to proceed. (TRACKING/MEETINGS WITH STAKEHOLDERS) \*5/12/2021 - Referred to Senate Transportation Committee

<u>AB 232 Gallagher (R – Yuba City) Off-highway vehicles: reciprocity</u>: Existing law requires every off-highway motor vehicle that is not registered under the Vehicle Code to display an identification plate or device issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles, with certain exceptions, including an off-highway motor vehicle with a currently valid identification or registration permit issued by another state. Except as otherwise specified, a violation of the Vehicle Code is punishable as an infraction.

This bill would permit application of that exception only if the other state recognizes an identification plate or device issued by the department as valid for use in that state. (SUPPORTING) \*5/12/2021 - Referred to Senate Transportation Committee

<u>SB 66 Allen (D – Santa Monica) California Council on the Future of Transportation:</u> <u>advisory committee: autonomous vehicle technology</u>: This bill would require the secretary to establish an advisory committee, the California Council on the Future of Transportation, to provide the Governor and the Legislature with recommendations for changes in state policy to ensure that as autonomous vehicles are deployed, they enhance the state's efforts to increase road safety, promote equity, and meet public health and environmental objectives. The bill would require the council to be chaired by the secretary and consist of at least 22 additional members, selected by the chair or designated, as specified, who represent, among others, transportation workers, various state and local agencies, and a disability rights organization.

The bill would require the council to gather public comment on issues and concerns related to autonomous vehicles and to submit, no later than January 1, 2024, a report to the Legislature with, among other things, recommendations for statewide policy changes and updates, and to continue to update the report, or submit a new report, of its recommendations biannually thereafter, or more frequently at the secretary's discretion. The bill would require the council to create subcommittees focused on one or more specific topics and to form one subcommittee led by the Office of Planning and Research focused on furthering the state's environmental, public health, and energy objectives, as specified. The bill would require the subcommittee to submit policy recommendations to the council and the Legislature by January 1, 2024, and to make those recommendations publicly available. (TRACKING/MEETINGS WITH STAKEHOLDERS) \*May 10th hearing: Placed on Appropriations Suspense file. Would need to pass out of Committee by End of May

# Bills At A Glance

<u>SB 227 Jones (R – Santee) Off-highway vehicles</u>: This bill would require, for the issuance or renewal of a competition identification, a specified configuration for the vehicle identification number and product identification number for an off-highway motor vehicle or ATV that is model year 2022 or later and is used solely for competition not on a public highway. The bill would impose restrictions on the operation of a competition motorcycle or ATV on public lands, including, among others, a requirement that a rider possess a current and valid competition card from a competition-sanctioning organization when practicing for a sanctioned event on public lands. Because operating a competition motorcycle or ATV on public lands in violation of those requirements would be a crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. (SUPPORTING) \*May 10th hearing: Placed on Appropriations Suspense file. Would need to pass out of Committee by End of May

<u>SB 799 Glazer (D – Orinda) Off-highway vehicular recreation: Carnegie State</u> <u>Vehicular Recreation Area: Alameda-Tesla Expansion Area</u>: This bill would require the Department of Parks and Recreation to preserve the portion of the Carnegie State Vehicular Recreation Area known as the "Alameda-Tesla Expansion Area" for conservation purposes, as specified. The bill would make implementation of this provision contingent upon at least \$9,000,000 being appropriated by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act or another statute, transferred, or donated to the Off-Highway Vehicle Trust Fund for its purposes. (OPPOSING)

Dual Similar Bill, AB 1512 Bauer Kahan, same District as Senator and the Assemblywoman that had their Bill Vetoed by Governor in 2019. \*May 3rd hearing: Placed on Appropriations Suspense file. Would need to pass out of Committee by End of May

On one of the rides, we stopped at a restaurant in Escondido and met up with a really cool 75+ year old lady who still rode with a side car. She was amazing. After meeting her, I wrote an article for the ABATE Bailing Wire, and told about the day and meeting this inspiring lady. In the article I wrote "I want to be just like her when I grow up!"

Yesterday, I was on a ride with a great group of folks from mostly Coffee County Tennessee, and we ended the ride at the VFW on the Lake in Estill Springs, Tennessee. We had attended a poker run fund raiser put on by one of the clubs in the area. When we got ready to leave, the wife of one of the members said to me: "I told the guys a little while ago that I wanted to be just like you when I grow up!" It made me smile. Little did I think what I said about that amazing lady over 40 years ago, would be said about me. Made me proud.

Back in the days before I rode, Grump and I had been interested in Motorcycle Rights, and often attend MMA meetings in the area although we didn't get involved with running the local chapter. Some of our friends did, however, and we kept up with what was happening.

In the mid-80s, ABATE Local 6 in San Diego was being formed. My friends Brian and Jane Trum invited me to a meeting at the Red Garter (aka the Red Gutter) in Ocean Beach, and I quickly ended up being the secretary for the Local. Around 1988, I attended my second Board Meeting, and the secretary couldn't make it, so I volunteered. The next year, I ran for the ABATE Board of Directors, was elected, and subsequently elected as State Secretary. Nine years later, I was still there doing both jobs. The next 9 years I was on the board and was elected Chairman.

When my husband, Grump, got extremely sick, I decided I could not take care of him and do justice to the members who elected me to the board. My decision was to finish the term and retire from State activities.

During my years on the board, I had the privilege of working with fantastic, dedicated bikers. We were able to write the Bylaws and Policies and Procedures that built the foundation of ABATE. Until I left for Tennessee in 2019, I stayed active in Local 6 holding the positions of secretary, Vice President, and President at various times.

ABATE of California is near and dear to my heart. There have been many changes, especially because one of the main goals became overturning the helmet law, and that has been put on a back burner. We worked hard on political campaigns for candidates that were on our side. We helped elect several politicians by slim margins because we worked for them... made calls, hung signs, stuffed envelopes...you name it, we helped. And the politicians learned who we were and came to us for help. The word spread quickly.

We--and I say we because I am one of the first Life Members of ABATE of California--still have many members who work with politicians and those who can influence what is needed in Motorcycle Rights. The main Goals may change depending on what is needed, and the organization has become flexible.

Unfortunately, there are still many people out there who wish we would just go away. I've told people before, and it still stands true: If we quit, they win, and that is totally unacceptable! Please do your part, join ABATE of California if you're not a member, or continue your membership, get involved and bring some friends with you!

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California has always allowed valid "out of state" OHV registered vehicles to use our public lands. It has come to our attention that some of our neighboring states have recently implemented a "non-resident" fee for OHV's being operated in their state. By no longer honoring our California registration these states are reneging on a long standing tradition in the OHV community. These new regulations will be expensive and prove onerous to every legally licensed OHV owner that travels and recreates in other states. Our ABATE OHV Division is asking for your help and financial support in fighting this type of legislation. Assembly Bill 2761 sponsored by Assemblyman Gallagher (Republican-Yuba City) seeks to remedy this issue of reciprocity and ABATE of California is asking you to help the OHV communities of our states restore equal access to OHV areas for all legally licensed users.

In addition to AB 2761, Abate of California is proposing two other bills for our elected official's to consider this year. Our first bill would require DMV to allow rider's to take both the M/C skill's test and their DMV written exam during their CHP certified M/C training classes. After a rider successfully completes and passes both tests the school would submit the information to DMV and they would issue a valid M/C endorsement card by mail to the rider that is valid for the duration of their current California drivers license. Upon license renewal the M/C endorsement would then be added to their new license thereby saving the student the time and expense. associated with visiting and testing at their local DMV office.

Our second bill would seek to exempt all M/C riders and especially our Military Veteran riders from being accessed a toll fee when traveling on a toll road within the state of California.

The Legislature is focusing on the State's Budget this Month with a June 15th deadline or they don't get paid - great incentive to pass the Budget on time, as they have done ever since Voters passed the State Ballot Proposition.

The State is flush with MONEY since the economy was bristling, despite the Pandemic! Then Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi and the Senate Democrats passed a massive Covid Bailout with only 19% related to the Covid assistance. The rest was PORK for State, City and Counties to bail them out. So more money for Californians' Budget! There is discussion of \$600.00 per person cash payout for those making less than \$75,000.00 at this time, plus \$500 for Dependents, some members are asking for tax rebates instead and those numbers could change as the State Budget moves forward.

Our bills are moving at this time:

SB 227 Jones to allow the sale and continued use of two stoke racing competition off-road bikes.

AB 232 Gallagher to allow reciprocity of off-road vehicles between states, saving our riders paying extra when operating out of state.

SB 799 Glazer and AB 1525 Bauer-Kahan, identical bills that will allow the sale of land that was to be used to expand the Carnegie Off Road park. Which we OPPOSE!

May was Motorcycle Awareness Month, we worked with Caltrans and the California Motorcyclists Safety Program on the Digital Road Signs, "Look Twice" and "Share the Road." So, keep riding and stay Safe!

Thanks as always to the Locals and Members for their continual contributions to the Dedicated Lobbyist Fund. Now even more important to keep us up here at State Capitol with Recall, Budget Surplus and 2000 potential new Laws in 2021.

# ABATE of Washington April Safety & Education

advocate, with well over 40 years of riding experience. Last month we looked at how to up our game when it comes to stopping. Now it's time to figure out how we can avoid needing to use those skills. If you find those things out there that will help you kill yourself early enough then you can come up with a plan on how to deal with them. "We know, Texas, it's all about keeping your head on a swivel" That is a really nice platitude, but what does it really mean? Without some sort of system, it's just random eyeball movements and grabbing at visual items. A really good rider has a system for how they scan, such as far (10-12 seconds out), for early warning, medium distance (6-8 seconds) to assess the threats located earlier, and near (4 seconds) to make the final decision on what to do. To compliment the multi-layer scan there needs to be a system to divide the visual clues into more ordered groupings, such as traffic signs and signals, then roadway characteristics, and then traffic patterns. For example, if you see a sign that says "right lane ends" and a yellow sign with an arrow indicating a left curve and an advisory speed of 30 and brake lights coming on ahead of you, it might be a logical presumption that the approaching corner might be fairly sharp or challenging. In more rural areas what can you discover looking well ahead at the roadway and what's the stuff on the sides of the road? Do the power lines on your right make a jog to the left? Do the trees seem to form a barricade ahead? What could that sort of information indicate about the road ahead? It sounds to me line way the road bends and how abruptly it does it. There is a plethora of situations out there, but the crux of the issue is how much advance notice you afford yourself. The sooner that you find things, the more time you have to plan for the hazards. Finding the latte stand on your right and the commuter coming at you in the oncoming lane soon enough and you can have some sort of plan for what to do if they decide that they absolutely must di

# HR 366 - Federal Anti-Profiling Legislation Introduced May 3, 2021

Last Friday, champions of the motorcycling community in the House of Representatives introduced a resolution addressing motorcyclist profiling. The resolution H. Res. 366 has three key points:

(1) promoting increased public awareness on the issue of motorcyclist profiling;

(2) encouraging collaboration and communication with the motorcycle community and law enforcement to engage in efforts to end motorcycle profiling; and

(3) urging State law enforcement officials to include statements condemning motorcyclist profiling in written policies and training materials.

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) applauds Congressman Tim Walberg (R-MI), Congressman Michael Burgess (R-TX), Congresswoman Cheri Bustos (D-IL), and Congressman Mark Pocan (D-WI) for introducing this bipartisan resolution in the House of Representatives.

During the 116th Congress, a record 138 Representatives cosponsored a similar resolution to the one introduced today yet it failed to reach the House floor for a vote. This came on the heels of the United States Senate unanimously passing a related resolution in 2018.

Legislative action against the profiling of motorcyclists is not limited to Washington, D.C. Across the country, state legislatures are considering measures aimed at combating the profiling of motorcyclists. The MRF is joined by the Motorcycle Profiling Project, state motorcyclist' rights organization, motorcycle clubs and individual riders taking a stand on this issue.

With the U.S. Senate on record on the topic and state capitals around the nation taking action it is imperative the House of Representatives follow suit and pass H. Res 366.

President of the MRF, Kirk 'Hardtail' Willard, stated "We thank Representatives Walberg, Burgess, Bustos and Pocan for their leadership on this important issue. Motorcyclists in every state are impacted by profiling. This issue isn't going away, and it's well past time for the House of Representatives to go on the record about the need to end motorcyclist

This year's NCOM Convention, to be held JULY 23rd – 25th, 2021 at the Holiday Inn Des Moines - Airport, located at 6111 Fleur Drive in Des Moines, Iowa (515-287-2400), will draw hundreds of concerned motorcyclists to America's Heartland to address topics of concern to all riders. All motorcyclists are welcomed and encouraged to participate in the many meetings, seminars and group discussions that focus on legislative efforts and litigation techniques to protect our riders' rights and preserve Freedom of the Road. Agenda items will cover legal and legislative issues, with Special Meetings for Veterans Affairs, Women in Motorcycling, Clean & Sober Roundtable and World of Sport Bikes, as well as the Christian Unity Conference and Confederation of Clubs Patch Holders Meeting.

<u>FEDERAL HIGHWAY BILL PRIORITIES</u>: In recent years, our nationwide biker community has worked diligently with Congress to include several key motorcycle-friendly provisions in the federal highway bill that died last session; H.R.2 "Moving Forward Act," including further prohibitions against motorcycle-only checkpoints, expanding anti-biker profiling restrictions based on mode of transportation or style of dress, and furthering riders' future advisory role with Congress to ensure our voices are heard when determining traffic and transportation laws, as well as advancing safety funding and autonomous vehicles protections.

Because H.R. 2 failed to pass, our lobbying efforts will need to be redoubled in the U.S. House and Senate once a new transportation measure is introduced in the 117th United States Congress, which now has an extended deadline of September 2021.

The Biden Administration may utilize a new highway reauthorization bill to pass a massive infrastructure spending plan, hoping to authorize some \$2.25 trillion on such items as road construction, mass transit, passenger and freight rail, airports and electric vehicles, with more than a trillion-and-a-half going toward expanding broadband, improving the electric grid, and a growing wish list of additional items.

As Congress begins deliberations on the package of transportation and infrastructure spending, it will once again fall on motorcyclists to ensure that riders' priorities are included in the "Wish List" as this 2021 version of the highway bill develops. You can contact your federal legislators by calling the Congressional Switchboard at (202) 224-3121, or contact their local office and set up a meeting to discuss these issues of importance to all motorcyclists!

<u>MOTORCYCLIST ADVISORY COUNCIL BILL IN CONGRESS</u>: A bipartisan group of U.S. Representatives has introduced a bill to reauthorize the Motorcyclist Advisory Council, a committee comprised largely of motorcycle riders established to advise Congress and the Department of Transportation on matters involving motorcycle safety, and make recommendations regarding infrastructure issues such as road design, traffic issues, and intelligent transportation systems.

H.R. 2141, introduced March 23, 2021 by Rep. Mike Gallagher (R-WI), would reauthorize the MAC for six years; require biennial reports; clarify that specific seats on the 12-member board would be occupied by motorcycle riders and advocates.

If Congress doesn't take action prior to the September 30, 2021 deadline, the MAC is set to expire and will be disbanded, so contact your Congressional representatives today and ask them to cosponsor and support H.R. 2141.

<u>RPM ACT NEEDED TO SAVE MOTORSPORTS</u>: If you have made modifications to your car or motorcycle, or have an interest in motorsports and racing, you could be impacted by the Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports (RPM) Act, which was first drafted up after the EPA's Clean Air Act (CAA) in 2015 sought to make the conversion of production vehicles for "dedicated racing" illegal. Despite bipartisan support in Congress, the RPM Act has failed to pass, but because of the EPA's renewed push to restrict any vehicle modifications for motorsports purposes, the RPM Act is more important now than ever before.

Concerned about emissions, street vehicles -- cars, trucks, and motorcycles – can no longer be converted into racecars, according to the EPA, which recently announced that enforcement against high performance parts -- including superchargers, tuners, and exhaust systems -- is a top priority.

According to the automotive trade association SEMA (Specialty Equipment Market Association), the sale, manufacture and installation of performance parts for racing would also be a violation of the EPA's ruling.

The RPM Act would protect the racing culture in America by reversing the EPA's interpretation that the CAA prohibits the conversion of a motor vehicle into a racecar, and also safeguards the motorsports-parts industry's ability to sell products that enable racers to compete. The measure would clarify that it is legal to make emissions-related changes to a street vehicle for the purpose of transforming it into a racecar used exclusively in competition, and confirm that it is legal to produce, market and install performance equipment.

#### REEXAMINING THE DEFINITION OF A MOTORCYCLE

#### Background:

Currently the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) defines the term "motorcycle," for the purpose of the statute and regulations it administers, as "a motor vehicle with motive power having a seat or saddle for the use of the rider and designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact with ground" (49 CFR 571.3). This has not been revised or amended since initially defined back in 1967.

In recent years a new type of vehicle has entered our roadways, commonly called an autocycle. These autocycles are classified as motorcycles but have little resemblance or operational characteristics to that of a motorcycle. This ambiguity about autocycles has created a patchwork of rules and regulations regarding licensing, insurance, registration and training courses from state to state

#### MRF Position:

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation encourages NHTSA to carefully review and update the definition of a motorcycle. The MRF believes a more appropriate definition would be "a motor vehicle, as was originally manufactured, with mative power, having a seat or saddle requiring the rider to sit astride, designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground, steering controlled by handlebors, acceleration and braking controlled by handlebar and foot controls and capable of reaching speeds in excess of 30 mph."

In 2019 a bipartisan group of lawmakers sent a letter to NHTSA asking for clarification of the current definition and whether a revised definition might be appropriate. The lead author of the letter was Congressman Michael Burgess of Texas
