

The Federal Highway Administration led a road.




presentation for the group on motorcycle safety and crashes/fatalities. Their determination was to go after structural infrastructure based changes as opposed to behavioral; they used a baseline of 500 similar incidents recorded i.e. accidents at intersection, failure to stop or vehicles lack of visibility and determined that improving sight distance at intersections, better signage merging/oncoming traffic/pavement change and high friction surface treatment retroreflective striping would prevent and reduce accidents.

Executive Director

The Executive Director (ED) shall be the Chief Executive Officer and shall, subject to the control of the Board of Directors, (BOD) of which they may be a member, have general supervision, direction and control of the organization and Officers, except for duties delegated by the BOD to the Chairman of the Board or other officers. Other responsibilities shall include:

- 1. Official spokesman for ABATE of California on all non-political issues.
- 2. Coordinator between the State and Locals, which will include effectively maintaining and managing the Regional Rep (RR) network to aid the Regional Reps in working with the Locals.
- 3. Assist new and existing Locals in an advisory capacity.
- 4. Represent ABATE of California at meetings of safety groups, workshops, and other activities which affect motorcycling workshops, and other activities which affect motorcycling.
- 5. Maintain current information regarding all ABATE programs per Article IV, Section 2.a.5 of the ABATE Bylaws.
- 6. Work on establishing cooperation between motorcycle groups on a statewide basis in the common interests of motorcycle safety and political awareness of mutual interest.
- 7. Responsible for the production, distribution, maintenance and periodic updates of the Policies and Procedures Manual.

Regional Rep

Regional Reps (RRs) are State Officers and are appointed by the Executive Director subject to confirmation by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. RRs may also be removed by the Executive Director, again, subject to Board approval.

The function of the RRs is to improve communications among the State Officers and the Locals and assist the Local Presidents and other Local Officers in performing their duties. RRs will receive regular monthly reports from the Executive Director and will make regular reports to the Executive Director on the activities of the Locals. The purpose is to improve the communication among all members. The RRs will not direct the Local Presidents. In ABATE, direction comes from the members and flows upward. Members tell their Local President what they want to be done about a certain issue. The Local President will inform their RR, who passes that on to the Executive Director. The Executive Director informs the Board, as well as communicating with the other RRs, about the issue at hand.

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NCOM Biker Newsbytes

EPA ADMITS ETHANOL CAUSES ENVI-RONMENTAL DAMAGE: "The federal requirement to blend ethanol into gasoline on the theory that it will reduce the hypothetical global warming that hasn't appeared yet has been a joke from the start," states a newsbit circulated by Bikernet.com, and that "By adding a huge amount of demand for corn, it did push up prices for that commodity, and made vast swaths of the rural Midwest prosperous, though it has injured poor Mexicans and others who depend on corn for a substantial portion of their nutrition and driven up the price of feed used for animals, raising meat prices."

The net energy balance of ethanol production - subtracting the amount of energy necessary to grow the corn, transport it to refineries, and then transport the ethanol to gasoline producers - has been considered a substantial net energy gain. But now the EPA has finally issued a new report and admits that the ethanol mandate comes at a considerable environmental cost.

The Public News Service summarizes: "Federal law requires the EPA to assess the environmental impact of the fuel standard every three years, but the new report, issued in July, was four years overdue. According to David DeGennaro with the National Wildlife Federation, the report documents millions of acres of wildlife habitat lost to ethanol crop production, increased nutrient pollution in waterways and air emissions and side effects worse than the gasoline the ethanol is replacing."

"The bigger surprise is the fact that ethanol production and combustion significantly increases the production of nitrous oxides (Nox)," notes HotAir.com. "This combines with oxygen in the atmosphere when exposed to sunlight, producing ozone...and actually contributes to the formation of smog and leads to respiratory ailments for many people."

None of this speaks to the excessive costs that ethanol forces on drivers and auto manufactur-

ers, says <u>Bikernet.com</u>, concluding that; "Alas, the mandate is so popular with corn farmers in Iowa, home of the first round of presidential nominations, that President Trump (and other politicians) not only maintain the mandate, President Trump recently told an audience in Iowa that he was 'very close' to having EPA issue a waiver to the Clean Air Act to allow year-round sale of E-15."

SYNTHETIC PETROL IS ON ITS WAY: The concept of fuel for your bike that doesn't drain our dwindling oil reserves and offsets its C02 emissions with its very production is closer than we think, according to MotorcycleNews.com. "For decades, boffins have been trying to work out ways to synthesize petrol (gasoline) and diesel, but with recent strides by Ducati owners Audi and tech giants Bosch, synfuels could hit our pumps within the next decade."

The theory is to harness our natural resources to make petrol and diesel and be able to produce it on an industrial scale so that prices can match current fuel costs.

"The new fuel has many advantages. It isn't dependent on crude oil, it is compatible with the existing infrastructure and it offers the prospect of a closed carbon cycle," says Reiner Mangold, head of sustainable product development at Audi.

A huge amount of energy is necessary to process the fuel, but Audi and Bosch's plans involve a renewable energy source, such as solar or hydroelectric, to power the process. They say renewable electricity can make the process carbon neutral.

When combined with a potential carbon-free production process, it means internal combustion could be part of the environmental solution rather than the problem.

While all this might sound like science fiction, Audi produced their first synthetic petrol earlier this year, called e-Benzin, and is currently constructing a diesel production plant in Switzerland powered by hydroelectricity from a nearby dam. Mass production of this petrol is the next obvious step.

ACCIDENTS & FATALITIES DOWN AT STURGIS, DESPITE BIGGER CROWD: The number of fatal crashes during the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally was half that of last year's count, according to statistics released by the South Dakota Highway Patrol. During the two-week event, there were four fatal crashes, compared to eight during the same time period last year. Both injury and non-injury accidents were down more than 10% compared to 2017, and total citations issued during Sturgis were also down nearly ten percent to 987.

Meanwhile, more than half a million vehicles rolled into the small western South Dakota town of 6,900. Data gathered by the South Dakota Department of Transportation from nine locations around Sturgis show a nearly 8% increase in traffic over last year, which saw 469,100 vehicles.

For this year's 78th annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally, the tally was 505,969 vehicles, which includes motorcycles, automobiles, trucks and motor homes. Still, the number was shy of the 2015 traffic, when 747,032 vehicles rolled into the city for the 75th annual rally.

MOTORCYCLE INDUSTRY TRYING TO ATTRACT NEW RIDERS: Motorcycling in America is getting a makeover, as industry stalwarts and upstart competitors are trying to attract new riders who want something different from Harley's big burbling cruisers or screaming Japanese and European performance bikes, says CNNMoney.

The changes are in response to younger riders who are attracted to the efficiency and fun of two-wheel travel, but who don't want to buy into all the "biker" baggage.

"Millennials and Gen X'ers, they aren't always seeking to make motorcycling a lifestyle, where it's kind of everything you live for," said Tim Buche, president and CEO of the Motorcycle Industry Council. These younger riders are looking for motorcycles suited to a more casual relationship rather than a serious commitment.

With shifting tastes, some start-up motorcycle makers are offering "green" electric bikes, without the noise, vibration and pollutants of an internal combustion engine, while more well-established brands are putting design emphasis on spare simplicity, targeted at a more casual rider.

Even long-venerated Harley-Davidson announced it will start offering products aimed at reaching customers who aren't traditionally drawn to its renowned American retro-styled offerings, and will produce their first electric motorcycle -- the all-new LiveWire -- in 2019.

HARLEY REFUTES 'MISINFORMATION' ABOUT MOVING PRODUCTION OFF-SHORE: Harley-Davidson Inc. Chief Executive Officer Matt Levatich pushed back against what he called "misinformation" surrounding the Motor Company's announced plans to move some production overseas.

The iconic American motorcycle maker has been the subject of angry tweets from President Donald Trump since announcing in June it would move some production abroad to sidestep tariffs the European Union slapped on its bikes in retaliation to Trump's tariffs on imported steel and aluminum.

According to Bloomberg business news, "the spat heated up recently when President Trump said he would support a boycott of the company if it moved production overseas." Trump's pronouncement that "A Harley-Davidson should never be built in another country-never!," came a day after he welcomed nearly 200 'Bikers For Trump' supporters to his golf course in Bedminster, New Jersey, and a New York Times article cited some Harley-Davidson owners criticizing the company at the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally saying this was their last Harley.

Levatich said that the uproar surrounding the company's earlier announcement that it would move some of its production overseas "misinformation". He reminded employees and dealers that the purpose of this move is to keep their products competitive in their second biggest market. Harley doesn't sell motorcycles in the U.S. that are built overseas, and that won't change, Levatich said.

NEW MEXICO MRO CALLS OUT SHER-IFFS DEPUTIES FOR PROFILING BIKERS: A motorcycle rights group in New Mexico is calling

out the Bernalillo County Sheriff, claiming his deputies are profiling motorcyclists. "Being profiled, it's not a comfortable feeling," said Raymond Gallegos of the New Mexico Motorcycle Rights Organization (NMMRO), saying there's been a string of incidents with BCSO, prompting them to write a letter to Sheriff Manuel Gonzales.

Some see the patches, the leather and certain colors on riders and assume criminal. However, Gallegos, vice chair of the NMMRO, says that's far from the truth. "So many of our organizations really benefit the community. We're working for charities, we're raising money for this organization or that organization," he told KRQE News 13.

Gallegos says members of the NMMRO have reported three incidents over the last year that call into question BCSO's practices. It led the group to write a letter to Sheriff Gonzales that calls out the department for harassing, intimidating and even photographing riders.

So, NMMRO set up a meeting for July 30th with the sheriff. "We really wanted to see how our community and BCSO could work together to get ahead of this profiling issue," he said. "That was the intent of this meeting with the sheriff's department."

However, the meeting was canceled at the 11th hour and the department told KRQE that there's an ongoing operation to address reckless motorcyclists, but that deputies do not profile riders.

A re-do meeting has since been rescheduled, though NMMRO says it's also pursuing antiprofiling legislation, and is encouraging its members who were allegedly profiled to seek legal counsel.

WACO 'TWIN PEAKS' UPDATE: To keep readers apprised of the ongoing travesty of 'Waco' -- the May 2015 shootout involving police and club members attending a legislative meeting at the Twin Peaks Restaurant that left nine bikers dead and 20 wounded -- AIM/ NCOM Founder Richard Lester would like to share the following information gleaned from

Southwest Scooter News:

Prosecutors and an attorney for Jacob Carrizal, the Dallas Bandidos chapter president, have agreed to postpone the retrial of the Twin Peaks biker shootout defendant, which had been set for September 10, 2018. Carrizal is the first and only defendant to stand trial so far, and his first trial ended in a hung jury and mistrial in November 2017.

In a joint motion for a continuance, Robert Moody, McLennan County first assistant district attorney, and Chris Lewis, Carrizal's attorney, cite the volume of evidence needed to be reviewed, plus evidence federal prosecutors have agreed to share from the separate trial of two former Bandidos national leaders that both sides want to see, according to the Waco Tribune.

Besides McLennan County prosecutors, attorneys representing defendants in federal civil rights lawsuits filed over the mass arrests of 193 bikers after the Twin Peaks incident also have cited the need to see federal evidence from a Bandidos racketeering case in San Antonio as a reason for postponing proceedings in the civil cases.

Prosecutors re-indicted Carrizal and 23 other Twin Peaks defendants earlier this summer on riot charges and have said they do not intend to pursue the identical 'engaging in organized criminal activity' charges on which 155 bikers were indicted three years ago. Of those 155 cases, with defendants being held in jail for months on a million dollars bail each, all but 27 have been dismissed.

In the meantime, as his term grows short, Waco District Attorney Abel Reyna -- who failed in his re-election bid largely over his mishandling of the "Twin Peaks Shootout" cases -- is settling old scores before leaving office by firing prosecutor Amanda Dillon, the last of Reyna's remaining employees who provided information to the FBI during its investigation of DA Reyna, effectively blaming her for the mistrial in the Carrizal case.

HANOI TO BAN MOTORCYCLES: Vietnamese authorities have announced plans to ban


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motorcycles in Hanoi by 2030 in a bid to cut air pollution and improve locals' quality of life. The country's capital, Hanoi, is home to 7.7 million people and is one of the most polluted cities in Southeast Asia and only 38 days last year had air quality that was considered good by the World Health Organization.

The city is famous for its millions of motor-cycles (5m), and it is these -- together with coal-fired power plants, heavy industry, a surge in construction projects and the seasonal agricultural burning -- which authorities are blaming for the pollution.


In an attempt to combat the air quality problem and boost public transport, Hanoi city council announced in early August that powered two-wheelers would be banned by 2030.

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
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Sporty's Rides

Motorcycle Safety Report

Winding Down the Season

Every year around this time we start to notice the change. It's not dreaded but needed. I can only take so much of summer. The fall for me is the best time to ride. Spring is a close second. Around So Cal does it really matter? Our zone is year-round riding, period! On any given day you can ride with a tee shirt, even days in November through January!

As our weather changes, we do as well. The short days and cooler nights have us rethinking our preparation so as not to get caught in a cold or wet zone. It can really stop you in your tracks. I think we could all agree that we've been there and did the mandatory suffering required while riding home. If you're on the wrong side of a mountain, then you'll virtually have minutes to get down (if you're like me sometimes, and think it's hot this afternoon and dress like that for the day) and get out of that frosted atmosphere. I don't know how it does it so fast, but when the sun crests any mountain the temperature on the back side (shady side) drops like a lead balloon and if you aren't dressed properly, suffer you will! After suffering this many times, I finally figured it out check out the friggin weather zones you're riding into or out of. A 100 miles away could be 30 plus degrees different and being far from home your closet is not feasible to access. I hate shopping for warm weather clothes on the road knowing I have a closet full of warm weather clothes. It's just not in my budget and my mind.

I have been researching previous articles and notes to bring a fresh re-write. It's about education of safety as a motorcycle enthusiast! I can remember in my schooling years that it was about education, the more the better, and not focus on one but all. With that I mean, it's not about the institutional schooling while in school, but the continuation of learning after the fact. With the way our society is now, you gotta get schooled constantly because of progress. Nowadays, progress is measured in days, not like yesteryear, where there was no end sight in progress or time limits. Today we are very impatient and expect everything faster than last time!

We all have built in learning yearnings. Some have it really easy and some have to relearn all

the time. Is one better than the other? Would you prefer to hear some things once or constantly hear it from not one source, but, hopefully many? All I know is that constant education, whether it is new or just a re-read, is important! Please don't laugh or scoff at someone who's preaching safe riding. Don't think that you know everything. Don't be satisfied just because you got a license motorcycle safety goes way beyond that!

When I think about ABATE and its capabilities, it re-enforces my thinking of freedom and our rights and most importantly education, not just for the motorcyclists, but for all drivers of vehicles on our roads. Spread the word every day, because there are new drivers and riders every day and we don't want to meet them by

Let's single out one aspect of education here. I call this a rundown of where I'm going whether solo or with a group. I think about all things that could dictate my route and the possibilities of what could be unforeseen, i.e. road conditions, heavy traffic, weather changes at a different distant destination, understanding where you are riding to (especially if it's new) and know where the gas is!

I personally do a quick mental shakedown to get my brain thinking. This is about me and how I prepare for a ride, especially if I'm putting on major miles for the day. I know what I have to do because it's my plan in my head and that's how

In a group I change my mindset because everyone has to be accounted for and it's important that everyone is on the same page. When I'm with others we talk about all things for the ride and who's doing what for the group to include safety in our group as we ride. This is important and should not be taken lightly. Things can happen and being prepared mentally as well as physically is just being safe, not just for you but for everyone!

Have you ever ridden in a group and then you notice that half your party or less is with you after miles of riding? This is not uncommon. I've been on both ends of this and it can get yer heart a pumping real fast. I have been on the brokendown side of this to the minor accident side and it's not fun at all. It can definitely be a buzzkill. That's why it's important to have a pre-ride safety meeting.

As our season changes around September through October, it's a good time to dance with your bike! You know - oil change, tune-up or any other scheduled maintenance. When I ride during the summer I know my bike will make it to the next season but, I have to now ensure myself that it's time to do the walk and make it to the end of the year. This means one of my yearly inspection detail jobs of my bike after I do the liquid exchange thing.

I've always said that, when you detail your bike (not the quick run through), have your tools with you as well. It's a great time to be intimate with your bike especially this time of the year. As our weather begs us to ride we must insure to ourselves that our bike is so safe that we can

only blame forces out of our control, i.e. accidents, no matter who's at fault! There is the mechanical failure possibility though, but the odds are in our favor, here's why. As a rider of the V twin, my main responsibility

is making sure that it's in top condition to my

best ability. I cannot afford to have a mechanic to go through my bike periodically to make sure it's in tip top shape. I have them work on what I cannot do or don't want to do, therefore, I know my limitations. The most important things are the little ones that matter, visual inspection is as important as tightening loose nuts and bolts.

I cannot count how many nuts, bolts, hex heads, Phillip heads, etc. that's on my bike, let's just say it's never ending! When I go through my bike I use the term 'zones', i.e. tires, handle bars, right side, left side, frame, engine and drive chain. I go through the zones so as not to miss anything. It's my checklist, my way of doing it. Besides, at my age I need to re-assure myself that all things are really done.

In my way of thinking, this is where safety is first! Have you ever had one of your mirrors start flapping or cart wheeling while you're riding? How about a turn signal knocking on your knee cap? These little things can distract you as well as piss you off. I even had my gear shifting knob disappear once and that really sucks! I then wished that I would have checked these things out before I rode out. I'm not saying to go through your bike thoroughly every time, but sometimes a quick visual inspection can prevent things from

As far as the visual inspection goes, it's important! As I was detailing my bike, wiping down my clutch cable I noticed wear at the middle section where the fork lock is. It was rubbing against the cable and was ready to sever the line. Having a broken clutch cable while riding truly sucks! After many years of servicing my bike as I detail it, I kind of know what nuts and bolts pretty much hold their own. It's usually the cosmetic things we add that need the most attention, but then again, anything on a V twin can and will loosen up at any given time!

Visual inspection is important, it could lead you into getting your hands dirty. How often do you check your tires? Do you roll your bike to inspect the tires 360 degrees? Or are you satisfied with what you see when it's parked? Do you look for improper wear or fatigue? How old are your tires? If you ride 3 to 6 thousand miles a year the treads might look good, but are your tires hard or dried out or showing signs of cracking? A flat tire on the side of the road is just as bad as a broken clutch cable.

You can easily inspect your disc brakes for even wear, that's just too easy to do, but really important. Remember them old brake drums? You had to do some major work before you could inspect them visually and now days it's right there in front of you with easy access.

One last thing, tire pressure! After all is said and done, proper tire pressure can save your life, period! Don't be lazy or think it's okay just because your tires look good, just do it!

Why is preventative maintenance a part of my safety program? I want to have a good time while riding. I want everyone to have a good time riding. When you know your bike is up to your standards of being safe to ride you will have a good time riding. We all know stuff happens, but was it preventable? That's on you!

We have a great season of riding ahead of us, let's all enjoy it and ride safer than last time.




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

AB 1595 prohibits the use of (approved/sanctioned racing style) seat belt harnesses, prohibits the addition of full roll cages, and requires mandatory helmet use in these and ONLY these vehicles.

Portions of this law went into effect on January 1, 2013 and all parts of the law were enforced on July 1, 2013. AB 1595 had an immediate and very negative impact on side-by side safety and prevents the use of many of these family recreational vehicles that have been upgraded with additional safety equipment.

Please join ABATE of California in our quest to repeal this poorly written legislation and help us restore the rights of side-by-side owners statewide who use these vehicles for safe and responsible family off-road recreation.

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
