




The February 27th deadline for bill introductions will have passed by the time you read this. However, the deadline for my Bailing Wire article is the 15th of the month for all of us newsletter contributors. I have reviewed all of the legislation already introduced and will finish after February 27th (another estimated 2000+ bills will be introduced) and forward the ones affecting US as Motorcyclists to our Legislative Director, Chuck Pedersen, as I have always done. He will forward them to the Legislative/ PAC committee for review and positions to be taken.

That being said, we have a lot on our plate already this year. A lane sharing bill, AB 51, by Assemblyman Bill Quirk (D-Hayward) and co-authored by Assemblyman Tom Lackey (R-Palmdale), a former CHP officer, will codify the CHP's recommendations for lane sharing. The current version provides that a rider could only share lanes if the speed of traffic is 30 miles per hour or less, and the motorcycle is ridden no faster than 10 mph more than the

Our position, currently, is neutral unless the 30 mph provision is removed. The bill will probably be amended several more times. I am closely monitoring its every change to see if we need to modify our position to oppose it, if directed to do so by the Legislative/PAC committee.

A motorcyclist anti-profiling bill, AB 334, by Assemblyman Ken Cooley (D-Rancho Cordova), has been introduced, (Co-authors: Assembly Members Achadjian, Chavez, Gallagher, Gray, Olsen, Perea, and Wagner) and now our Legislative/PAC Committee can take a position after we review the introduced language of the bill.

A mandatory helmet law bill, SB 192, for adult bicycle riders has been introduced by Senator Carol Liu (D-Glendale) that has many of our fellow non-

motorized two-wheeled friends more than a little upset. I am monitoring this very closely, as well.

Lastly, I want to apologize to our fellow rider rights organization, the American Motorcyclist Association, for stating they were in support of the lane sharing bill (AB 51), discussed above.

I was told by Assemblyman Quirk's staff, and others, that the AMA was in support of the legislation, and they were the reasons for my comment. I spent from January 3rd to the 14th in and out of a medical center with my dying mother, and wrote my article from her hospital room. I did not have the opportunity to call Nick Harris, of the AMA, to confirm their position. My sincere apologies to all!


Texas has introduced two bills HB 813 and SB 442 regarding Lane splitting, (and per an article from Pickerington, Ohio; the American Motorcyclist Association is supporting "responsible lane splitting legislation in Texas".





But there are also some riders injured or killed by other riders who have been drinking.

Every time a rider goes down, it only strengthens some people's ideas that we need to be controlled, legislated, and regulated. Ride responsibly, ride safely, [ride sober] and if you're not comfortable riding with someone who has had too much to drink on a run, back off and allow enough room to avoid disaster if something happens.

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
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

Motorcycle Safety Report

Before Day One

Yes motorcycle safety has been around a long, long time, even before day one of the invention and production of motorcycles. It's true! I found out by watching an old, old, very old cowboy movie! It was so old black and white TV's were an amazing discovery! So I had to do extra research to back up John Wayne and Roy Rogers and all those before them into the, shall we say 1870's.

Pain has no prejudice on what you ride whether it is a horse, bicycle or motorcycle. When you hit the ground something is going to break or road rash and or bruising. Forget humility and foolishness, we've been doing that since day 37! I'm taking you back to the 1 horsepower days versus today's mega horse powered days, about the evolution of riding safety.

Yes riding safety has been around from about the time we figured out we can ride horses, you know, around when Larry King was born I guess. Back in them days when you rode and fell, you got up and rode again. It might have been a manly thing or pride, but nowadays when you ride, when you go down, you could be down for the count, recovery time is weeks or months or longer, speed is the main factor here, when riding a horse the top galloping speed might be 25 - 30 mph, versus for us nowadays is 25 - 120 mph!

They have modernized horse riding gear thru the ages for the horse and rider; we were thinking safety and comfort way back then. On parallel thinking, we were trained to ride horses by controlling the horse, i.e. steering, stopping, cruising to galloping, dodging trees and rocks, bushes, holes and whatever. We loved to go all out when we could. Competition riding and racing is as old as the dirt and it's something we love to do!

We've learned basically the same thing with motorcycles, we just do it faster! We would inspect our horses for our safety, prior to riding, you know checking the hoofs and shoes, cleaning and prepping each shoe/hoof, i.e. inspecting your tires, spokes and tire pressure, to include brakes and all cables. Then we would inspect the legs and joints and look for wear and tear or swelling and anything that looks like it needs attention, i.e. going thru yer bike tightening any loose bolts or adjusting cables, maybe testing your shocks and forks for functionality, and most importantly your electrical system to include your lighting. We inspected our horses while we cleaned and groomed them, then we would put on the riding equipment from the bit to the saddle, we made sure everything was right, i.e. we cleaned our bike and went thru it even more as we were preparing for a road trip, all the preventative measures we could think of. Remember this is done for our safety!





Horses were, and still are, very tough and hard working, they are practically maintenance free and very enduring, i.e. the motorcycles today are stronger (torque and horse power) and engineered to the point of lasting forever. If we keep up the proper maintenance regularly, they will last a long, long time, i.e. just like horses! Basically back in the day, if your horse, shall we say breaks a leg, while galloping in the middle of nowhere (and I say that without having a cell phone or roadside emergency phones) you're screwed! If you were tossed when this happened you could become buzzard food as well as your horse.

Now if you were riding your bike in the high dessert (all by yourself) and let's say you blew your rear tire and you went off the road into a gully and wrestled your bike before getting tossed into a rock bed, you painfully get your cell phone out while lying on your side and call for help. But you don't know where you're at exactly because you didn't tell anybody. Lesson one on safety: Let someone know of your riding route if you're riding solo, period! I kind of remembered this back when my mom always charted out her flight plan (she was a pilot of small planes) and showed us her route. It was mandatory, but I never thought about the safety aspect of it. Back in the day if some one was missing you'd look for buzzards in the sky. You don't have to be dead for them to be curious, and you are potentially their next meal! We have signs everywhere, even in the middle of nowhere. While riding you see mile markers and many other signs that indicate where you are, making a mental note of this as you ride or drive could save your life.

Now back in the horse days you pretty much had private instruction from your family and/or friends and interaction between fellow riders, and the rich had riding academies! We still do this and will continue for generations to come, we have private instructors and motorcycle safety courses from beginner to experienced riders everywhere. This is



a great thing, it's not about how many miles you put on that makes you a really good rider, it's about everything you do as a rider that makes you a really good rider! Practicing good riding habits takes time and every time you ride you can be challenged of the un-suspecting circumstances that you can handle or learn from it. Handling it means you chalk it up to experience and learning from it means you maybe crashed and got hurt and then chalked it up to experience (that's me), but you got back on that bike again.

We have had safety gear ever since we knew how to make and process cow skin for our protection. The cowboys used leather boots, chaps and gloves, although I wouldn't say their hats were a safety thing in those days, they did deflect bugs and shade your eyes. We still use the cow and because of modern technology we have synthetics for protection; we just replaced the cowboy hat with a helmet. If you look at the modern day horse riders you'll see more emphasis on rider safety as well as better protective clothing and gear. They have had their evolution as well. We have progressed as well, and because of speed and popularity our safety gear is really high tech. We have so many choices of protection we could look space aged (full body armor) or old school and just wear jeans, boots and opened fingered gloves!

All in all, having the best safety gear you can get doesn't do you any good if you don't have good riding skills. Safety gear might lessen injuries but they will not prevent you from being involved in an accident of any sorts. Do not let your ego make you think you're safe and impervious to accidents because that's when you'll get into trouble. Motorcycle safety should always be at the top of your list when planning a ride or just doing simple errands on a motorcycle.

I've always said, "It happens that fast!" It's not about who is wrong or right in an accident, it's about accident prevention. Know your surroundings when you ride. A person can loose control of a vehicle way ahead of you and cause a chain reaction that leads to you and then it's up to you and how you react. In today's driving scene everybody tailgates and that's why you always see multiple car accidents on all our roads. You have to rely on yourself and what you've learned and be prepared at all times. Remember there are a lot of new drivers and riders out there on the road that have very little experience and minimal insurance. You can't trust them on their safety education, you just don't know.

I always recommend taking motorcycle safety courses. Also get into discussions with other motorcyclists and talk about safety. You'll be surprised at the information you get! It seems to me that it doesn't matter how old you are or how experienced you are, accidents do happen, even to the best of us. Stupidity or lack of many things does happen and it's up to you on how you react!

As this New Year starts for us, please refresh your mind on safety as well as getting your bike ready and don't become a negative statistic! Always ride safer than last time and talk safety with the people you ride with. Riding is a great way of life!



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NCOM Biker Newsbytes

ANTI-PROFILING BILL INTRODUCED IN CALIFORNIA: Legislation aimed to curb anti-biker profiling has been introduced in California. Citing anecdotal evidence that Golden State motorcyclists tend to get pulled over unjustly, Assemblyman Ken Cooley (D-Rancho Cordova) authored a bi-partisan bill that would have police officers undergo training emphasizing that profiling of motorcycle riders is prohibited

The measure seeks "to ensure that anyone entering law enforcement in California knows the ground rules to apply the law fairly without regard for irrelevant factors of, 'I'm on a bike' or they're dressed a certain way," Cooley said, adding that "it is an important issue of people being secure in their persons and the administration of traffic laws."

Assembly Bill 334 would add Section 13519.17 to the Penal Code, relating to the profiling of motorcycle riders: "This bill would require the Commission on Peace Officer Standards And Training to ensure that the profiling of motorcycle riders is addressed in the course of basic law enforcement training and offered to law enforcement officers in conjunction with existing training regarding profiling," according to the Legislative Counsel's Digest.

Assembly Bill 334 would also require law enforcement agencies to create policies barring discrimination against riders.

NEW MEXICO HELMET LAW OPPOSED: Despite the fact that helmet legislation has only recently

been introduced in New Mexico, and not passed as yet by the state legislature nor signed into law, "I have received two complaints that in the last few days riders have been pulled over for no helmet use by city police in Albuquerque and have been given a verbal warning," reports Annette Torrez, chairperson for the New Mexico Motorcycle Rights Organization (NMMRO) and member of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM) Board of Directors.

"There is NO Mandatory helmet law in NM for any one over age 18, you can not be pulled over for the sole reason you are not wearing a helmet. This is profiling of motorcyclists," added Torrez, who further suggests that; "The only way to address this is, if you get pulled over please get the officer's name, badge number and car number and notify NMMRO (www.thenmmro.org)."

In the meantime, the national office of the U.S. Defenders (www.usdefender.net) has issued a nation-wide CALL TO ACTION to oppose the two current helmet bills which were introduced into the 2015 legislature; Senate Bill 327 requiring the use of helmets for all motorcycle operator and passengers, and Senate Bill 308 creating a distinctive motorcycle validation sticker (\$692) allowing qualified operators and passengers to refrain from wearing a safety helmet.

"We must unite and fight this or by this summer it could be mandatory for every biker to wear a helmet in New Mexico," according to the US Defenders' CTA, which goes on to state; "We were told that the Centers for Disease Control are following this bill in New Mexico as a pilot program, if it passes, for other states in the future."

TEXAS LEGISLATION WOULD ALLOW RID-ERS TO LANE SPLIT IF HELMETED: One of the latest proposals by some Texas lawmakers to help al-



leviate traffic congestion is to legalize lane splitting. Lane splitting (or lane sharing, or "filtering") allows motorcyclists to pass vehicles by riding in-between lanes of traffic.

State Senator Kirk Watson and State Representative Sergio Muñoz Jr. have both filed bills to legalize the practice.

According to House Bill 813, introduced by Rep. Muñoz (D-Palmview), motorcycle riders would be allowed to ride between lanes of traffic moving in the same direction, if traffic is traveling 20 mph or slower, and if the motorcyclist is not traveling more than 5 mph faster than other traffic. Lane splitting would be prohibited in school zones and in areas where the posted speed limit is 20 mph or less. However, HB 813 would also require that riders and passengers must wear helmets.

Senate Bill 442, introduced by Sen. Watson (D-Austin), does not include the helmet provision, but lane splitting would be restricted to controlled-access highways.

"Filtering" is common in Europe and Asia to alleviate congestion in urban areas, but in the U.S., only California allows the maneuver.

ILLINOIS MEASURE WOULD ADD MOTOR-CYCLE SAFETY TO DRIVER'S ED: An Illinois lawmaker wants driver education teachers to warn beginner motorists to be on the lookout for motorcycles by incorporating motorcycle safety as a formal part of driver's education courses.

The proposal, introduced February 17, 2015 by Representative Tom Bennett (R-Gibson City), would amend the driver's education act in the Illinois School Code to require that all behind the wheel instruction include lessons on motorcycle safety and awareness "to ensure students understand their surroundings when operating a motor vehicle."

Rep. Bennett says the concern was raised by constituents in his central Illinois district. Bennett says he purposely kept the language in the proposal general to give schools flexibility.

INDIANA SCOOTER RIDERS FACE NEW REGULATIONS: Indiana officials are warning motor scooter drivers that starting January 1 they'll need license plates on those bikes. Legislators have approved Indiana's first license requirements for scooters, and under the new law drivers of scooters with engines of 50 cubic centimeters or less will need to buy license plates and pass a Bureau of Motor Vehicles test involving road signals and signs. Operators of scooters with larger engines will be required to follow motorcycle requirements, including holding a valid motorcycle license or learner's permit.

Evansville police officials told a legislative committee that scooters had often been involved in accidents and used in crimes such as robberies, but that the owners couldn't be found because they lacked any registration.

The new law doesn't require insurance for drivers of the smaller scooters, and the registration will cost \$26.35, plus a \$10 excise tax.

Law sponsor Representative Dave Wolkins (R-Winona Lake) said not requiring a driver's license for scooter operators was important because he felt it was necessary that those with drunken driving convictions still have a way to get to work.

ARIZONA MAY DUMP HANDLE BAR HEIGHT

LAW: Arizona has a bill running to eliminate their handle bar height law completely, and motorcycle organizations are asking riders from neighboring states and those who visit the Grand Canyon State to contact Arizona legislators to support House Bill 2345, which recently breezed through the House rules committee.

Introduced by Reps Karen Fann (R-Prescott) and Chad Campbell (D-Phoenix), HB-2345 would amend ARS 28-964 to remove the restriction which specifies that a person cannot operate a motorcycle, all-terrain vehicle or motor driven cycle equipped with handle-bars positioned so the operator's hands are above their shoulders when the operator is sitting and their hands are on the handlebar grips. The bi-partisan measure would also eliminate the requirement for motorcycles to be equipped with handrails for passengers.

In addition, Arizona bikers are fighting a similar "pay-to-play" bill as in New Mexico, as House Bill 2607 seeks to require use of a helmet for all motor-cyclists unless the rider pays a fee for exemption (amount to be determined), or face a \$500 fine for non-compliance.

U.S. MOTORCYCLE SALES CONTINUE UP-

WARD TREND: The Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) reports motorcycle sales increased 3.8% for 2014. A total of 483,526 motorcycles were sold during the calendar year, an increase of 17,743 units over 2013. Off-Highway motorcycles registered the highest percentage year-over-year growth at 10.9%, with the On-Highway and Dual segments tallying 3.0 and 3.6% respectively. Scooter sales were the only two-wheeled segment to decline last year, down 3.5%. Meanwhile, ATV sales showed a steady 0.5% rate of growth.

The 2014 motorcycle sales total marks the fourth consecutive year of modest growth since the market bottomed out in 2010 at 439,678 units sold. Annual motorcycles sales have since increased by 440,899 (2011), 452,386 (2012) and 465,783 (2013) to its current 483,526 total. This gradual recovery follows the dramatic decline of the motorcycle market during the recession, when annual motorcycle sales plummeted from 879,910 in 2008 to 520,502 in 2009.

LANE "FILTERING" RIDES INTO AUSTRA-

LIA: New rules have come into effect for motorcycle riders in Queensland, Australia as of 1 February 2015, including safe lane filtering. "Lane filtering can be a complex manoeuvre requiring plenty of on-road experience to be done safely, so only fully licensed riders are allowed to lane filter," Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR) says on its website, noting heavy penalties for riders who don't follow the rules.

DTMR said motorcycle riders who hold an open licence for riding a motorcycle may lane filter at speeds not greater than 30km/h between stationary or slow-moving vehicles travelling in the same direction as them, provided it is safe to do so.

New rules also allow riders to ride on road shoulders and in emergency stopping lanes.


vehicles that have been upgraded with additional safety equipment.
