

## Lobbyist's Legislative Report

The California Highway Patrol notified me that the CMSP Advisory Committee, on which I represent ABATE as its voting member, will convene in March to discuss the language in the *NEW* proposed guidelines for Lane Splitting. To date, I have not received any draft language or proposals. We were requested to confirm that we still wanted to be a part of review process for Lane Splitting, which I responded enthusiastically *YES* in order to consider, approve or disapprove proposals. Once received, I will forward any proposed language to our Legislative Committee for review and to advise ABATE's stance on a position. *STAY TUNED*!

The Legislature just introduced over a thousand *NEW* Bills on Friday, February 17<sup>th</sup> — the last day to introduce Bills for this calendar year. This brings the total number of new bills for the first part of the 2017/2018 session to 2,600! After reading all these bills it appears there is NO NOISE or SMOG Bill, so far, this session. But we remember AB 1595, in 2012, by Assemblyman Cook who took a spot bill and used it to amend in a helmet requirement for use in offroad Side x Sides toward the end of the session. We will be vigilant, staying on top of *ALL* Bills, keeping an eye out for amendments during this session for anything related to *NOISE/SMOG* being pushed by the motorcycle manufacturers or their lobby, and any other anti-motorcycle/motorcyclist legislation until they adjourn on September 15<sup>th</sup>.

We were successful in getting Senator Jean Fuller to introduce SB 672, which will remove the sunset (the law is repealed unless the sunset is removed) that requires cities, counties & Caltrans to remove, replace and recalibrate sensors at traffic lights to detect motorcycles and bicycles when they do repairs on, or while installing new, sensors and lights at Intersections, ABATE was the Original Sponsor in 2007-2008 AB 1581 with then Assemblywoman Fuller.

The other bill that we are co-sponsoring with the California Motorcycle Dealers Association is AB 1027 by Assemblyman Dante Acosta — Intermediate Motorcycle Riders Course. This bill will allow Experienced Riders (adults who have many years riding off-road, or who are returning to motorcycle riding after years/decades of being away) to progress straight to a new 1-day condensed skills course. Once the 1-day course is passed, they will receive a Motorcycle Skills Test Waiver (DMV DL 389). They will still need to pass a DMV written test — however, they can bypass taking the riding "Lollipop" Test.

Thanks again to all the Members and Locals who send money to the dedicated Lobbyist Fund to keep me working for you in the Capital!







Please make sure to check your bike over, especially if it's been sitting for a while. You should be checking tire pressure and doing a pre-ride inspection before any ride, but it's even more important to make sure everything on your bike is in good shape after not riding it during the colder and wet weather.

At our meeting on January 19<sup>th</sup> Craig Griswold and Mary Kirby were visiting from Penn Valley. We had nine members in attendance.



Even though this is an "off-year" in our California election cycle, ABATE PAC and our Lobbyist, Jim Lombardo, will still be hard at work monitoring proposed legislation being introduced by both our new and returning legislators in Sacramento. Over the years we have found that we can be very effective in influencing the wording, passage and even defeat of bills we feel are not in the best interest of motorcyclists as long as we keep a "sharp eye open" and "an ear to the ground" in the halls of our legislature. Some of these bills are simply poorly written, some are not necessary, and some are outright discriminatory. Our job is to help bills that benefit us and to bring everything else to a screeching halt before it becomes passed into law and we are very, very, good at what we do.

You can become part of this process by becoming an ABATE PAC member. The requirements are simple. Be a

current member of ABATE of California, attend two consecutive ABATE PAC meetings, and finally-do not miss more than two consecutive PAC meetings in a row. Simple enough and very easy to do. 



## GOTTEN: It is with great sadness that we report the death of longtime Freedom Fighter, Butch Har-

BUTCH HARBAUGH, GONE BUT NOT FOR-

baugh, former Chairman of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists - Legislative Task Force (NCOM-LTF), among other positions. Butch passed away February 7th from heart failure and cancer.

"When I began as the AIM (Aid to Injured Motorcyclists) and NCOM Attorney for Oregon back in the late 1980s, Butch was actively involved with ABATE, and with BikePAC since it was founded," recalls Sam Hochberg, AIM Attorney Emeritus, and now Of Counsel to Christopher Slater, Oregon & Washington AIM Attorney. "He spent many years as the lobbyist for ABATE, and was wellknown, respected and liked by many in the legislature in Salem."

A biker rights activist since the 1970s, Butch attended and helped organize many STEAM conferences and ABATE/BikePAC planning retreats. He was a regular at many ABATE runs around the state, often helping AIM Chief of Staff "Gunny" now retired, at the AIM/NCOM tables, and was known and highly respected in the biker's rights community nationwide.

Butch also participated in many NCOM Conventions, and in 2003 was bestowed with the Ron Roloff Lifetime Achievement Award, NCOM's highest tribute. This year's 32nd Annual Convention, to be held over Mother's Day weekend May 11th-14th in Reno, Nevada at the Silver Legacy Resort Casino, will be dedicated in his honor.

For the past dozen or so years, Butch lived with his loving wife Laura in Rigby, Idaho, where he enjoyed riding his Panhead and was active in the home-brewing community. Always friendly, engaging and enthusiastic about motorcycles and biker's rights, he will be greatly missed.

With the 32nd Annual NCOM Convention in Reno just weeks away, at this time the National Coalition of Motorcyclists is requesting that MROs, motorcycle clubs, and riding associations submit the names of those members and supporters who have died since last May, so that we may honor their memories during the traditional "Ringing of the Bell" tribute to fallen riders during the opening ceremonies. ## NHTSA SEEKS TO CURB DRIVER DIS-

TRACTIONS: The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) is proposing new federal guidelines to provide a safety framework for developers of portable and aftermarket electronic devices to use when developing visual-manual user interfaces for their systems. According to NHTSA and the Department of Transportation (DOT), their "Visual-Manual NHTSA Driver Distraction Guidelines for Portable and Aftermarket Devices" [Docket No. NHTSA-2013-0137] will

"encourage innovative solutions such as pairing



and Driver Mode that, when implemented, will reduce the potential for unsafe driver distraction by limiting the time a driver's eyes are off the road, while at the same time preserving the full functionality of these devices when they are not used while driving."

Driver distraction is a specific type of inattention that occurs when drivers divert their attention away from the driving task to focus on another activity. This distraction can come from electronic devices, such as texting or emailing on cell phones or smartphones, and more traditional activities such as interacting with passengers, eating, or events external to the vehicle.

The crash data indicate that visual-manual interaction (an action that requires a user to look away from the roadway and manipulate a button or interface) with portable devices, particularly cell phones, is often the main distraction for drivers involved in crashes.

In 2015, 10% of the 35,092 traffic fatalities involved one or more distracted drivers, and these distraction-affected crashes resulted in 3,477 fatalities, an 8.8% increase from the 3,197 fatalities in 2014. Of the 5.6 million non-fatal crashes in 2014, 16% were distraction-affected crashes, and resulted in 424,000 people injured.

At any given time, an estimated 542,073 drivers are using hand-held cell phones while driving.

Currently no safety guidelines exist for portable device technologies when they are used during a driving task.

#### RESEARCHERS BLAME "OTHER DRIV-ERS" FOR MOST MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENTS:

An Australian study states "failure of other drivers to give way" as the most common factor in motorcycle accidents. Research by Monash University in Melbourne has found that human error was the primary contributing factor for 94% of bike accidents. "Whilst with single-bike crashes, rider error and loss of control were found to be the most common causes, for incidents involving more than one vehicle, it was found that 'motorcycle crashes occurring in lighter traffic more likely involved an error by another driver, including such things as failure to give way'."

The motorcycle crash research studied over two hundred and thirty accidents between January 2012 and August 2014, with nurses at the hospitals and crash scene investigators aiding with the compilation of the data.

"Whilst car drivers were responsible for the majority of accidents in less-dense traffic, it was the motorcyclist to be more likely at fault for most 'urban' crashes and collisions however," Trevor Allen of the Monash University Research Centre told The Herald Sun newspaper, adding that this was

most likely due to the greater frequency of danger; "Higher traffic density leads to more hazards and a higher level of difficulty for riders to move safely in and among traffic, compared with other vehicles."

The research also found that the older the rider, the less likely it was that the rider was primarily to blame for the accident.

#### STUDY SHOWS MOTORCYCLE MARKET EXPANDS WHILE E-MOTO SALES FLAT-

TEN: According to a study by the market research

company Freedonia Group, global demand for all types of motorcycles is projected to climb 3.8% per year through 2020 to 113 million units. Internal combustion engine (ICE) models have historically dominated the global motorcycle market, but demand for e-bikes and electric scooters, motorcycles, and mopeds has grown rapidly. In 2005, electric models accounted for just 22%

of worldwide motorcycle sales. Their share of the market grew to 35% in 2015, as the use of electric motorcycles in China increased sharply.

"Multiple developed countries – particularly Germany, the Netherlands, and the U.S. – also registered rapid electric product sales growth during the 2010-2015 period," said analyst Gleb Mytko.

Global demand for ICE motorcycles is forecast to increase 5.5% per year through 2020, according to Freedonia Group's World Motorcycle Sales Study, with advances fueled by strong ICE product sales gains in a wide range of industrializing nations. As personal incomes in these countries rise between 2015 and 2020, more households will be able to afford motorcycles. Improving market conditions in the U.S., Western Europe, Japan, and other mature markets will contribute to growth as well.

Worldwide sales of e-bikes and electric motorcycles, scooters, and mopeds is projected to be flat during the 2015-2020 period because of declining product demand in China, by far the world's largest market for electric models, though demand for electric motorcycles outside of that country is forecast to grow at a double-digit annual pace.

In developed nations, e-bikes will continue to rapidly capture market share from bicycles.

LANE-SPLITTING BILL INTRODUCED IN LONE STAR STATE: Texas is contemplating becoming only the second state, after California, to allow motorcycle riders to split lanes in heavy traffic under certain conditions. Senate Bill 228 was introduced on December 9th, 2016, and if passed would make it legal for motorcycles to ride between lanes of traffic on limited-access or controlled-access highways during periods of traffic congestion at a speed not more than 5 mph above the speed of other traffic, and only if that traffic is moving at 20 mph or less.

Lane-splitting, which was a long-standing but legally-ambiguous practice in California until it was made legal there in 2016, is common in Europe where motorcycles typically "filter" to the front of the line at intersections and ride between lanes of traffic in crowded cities. Lane-splitting advocates in the U.S. cite the safety of the practice overseas as well as its effect on reducing traffic congestion.

NEW HAMPSHIRE LEGISLATION COULD REPEAL HANDLEBAR HEIGHT LAW: Legislation repealing the restriction on the height of motorcycle handlebars -- Senate Bill 27, by Senator Harold French (R-Franklin) -- carried the New

Hampshire Senate by a voice vote on January 19<sup>th</sup> and has been referred to the House of Representatives where most likely it will be assigned to the Transportation Committee.

The current law prescribes that the hand grips can be no higher than the shoulders of a rider seated in the saddle. Charlie St. Clair, executive director of the Laconia Motorcycle Week Association, told the Laconia Daily Sun that if the House endorses and the governor signs the bill, New Hampshire will become the 19<sup>th</sup> state and first in New England not to restrict the height of handlebars, but it's not clear whether the restriction will be lifted before the 94<sup>th</sup> running of Laconia Motorcycle Week in June.

As the host of the nation's oldest rally, which attracts visitors from across the country, St. Clair said that New Hampshire should not impose restrictions that may inconvenience motorcyclists from other states. Limits in other states vary considerably from shoulder height in Massachusetts, Maine and Connecticut, to eye level in some states and to heights above the saddle measured in inches in others. Most restrictions on high bars, called "ape hangers" were introduced in the 1960s. Although touted as a safety measure, many motorcyclists claimed the restrictions were imposed to provide police with a pretext for stopping and searching bikers.

MISSISSIPPI CONSIDERS LOWERING SALES TAX ON MOTORCYCLES: Legislation has been introduced (House Bill No. 1631 by Representative Steve Hopkins R-D7) which would "reduce the sales tax rate on retail sales of motorcycles from 7% to 5%," as well as reduce the sales tax on other agricultural and farming products. On February 15th, the legislation was referred to the House Ways and Means Committee.

#### QUINCY MIDNIGHT MOTORCYCLE BAN -

FALSE!: According to the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association (MMA), a recent report on quincy.com indicating that the City of Quincy, MA, has instituted a ban against any motorcycle being









ridden between the hours of Midnight and 5 am, unless exempted for work or emergency purposes, is NOT correct.

Although such a proposal was indeed filed, the council member who introduced it "immediately asked that it be withdrawn" after learning that such a proposal would not be legal.


I cruised during the week to Top Rocker and got more raffle prizes with my rewards point card. It was cloudy and it started to rain slightly but not enough to cause major con-




This concludes my Sporty Rides for this month. Again, please do ABATE rides, ABATE meetings and try to get new members for ABATE.

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

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

# **Motorcycle Safety Report**

#### The New Me

I've been riding for so long it just seems weird to me sometimes to see the now generation riding. I know I was in their boots and was looked at in a similar view. I look at them in multiple ways, first is their attitude. Are they mean spirited punks that think they know everything? Are they the liars that hide behind their masks, you know these people, kind on the outside but vicious behind your back? You have the nonchalant biker who can co-mingle with everyone and is respected because of the calming effect they have all the time.

The one that worries me the most is the biker, no matter what age that is new to riding or hasn't ridden since their youth days. I have seen the ramifications of inexperience and it has no prejudice. I have been witness to some that have crashed and quit riding to some that chalk it up to experience. I've seen the serious endings of friends and wondered what the hell went wrong.

The biggest IF I've ever had - well you know what I'm talking about if you ever lost a friend or loved one while riding. Thinking back I realized how much your parents can influence you and back you up as you progress through your riding years. I relied on my dad and his scary friends (some of them could scare your last meal out of you) for shall we say education, it was cool, but it was no controlled student teacher environment if you know what I mean. My mom had her own plane and was a pilot so danger was never an issue with her.

What this means is that we can learn (get educated) as we face our day to day lives. It's what we absorb in our mind that develops us. It doesn't mean going to class every day, it's about the communication from one or more individuals to you for anything, especially if it's motorcycle safety etc. What's BS to one person is valuable information to the other. That's what I have learned and I have a degree in both hearing and telling!

The newer bikes of today are about power and performance and looks can be secondary. We are kind of prejudiced in what we ride, like me for instance. I couldn't afford American built bikes but I wanted to ride so bad it didn't matter to me, even though I was the butt end of jokes by my dad and his friends, it was about riding.


Let's fast forward all of this to today. Riding today is so much different than the yesteryears of our past, it's true, period. We emphasize safety first not only for the motorcyclist but for the drivers of automobiles. We have many organizations worldwide, promoting education for both riders and drivers! But, all this boils down to the individual rider amidst all the hoopla of the world! It's all about your skill level. It's about what you do in real time, there is no simulated training out there that could impact you more than what could happen to you in real time! But it is a great start, and what's cool is there are

many groups, whether private or just a bunch of bikers, talking about real current day riding and sharing information that's really good. Kind of like me listening to the old farts of the past! You also have private schools and teachers that will give you or a group safety lessons as well as riding lessons. The information highway is so enormous and worldwide you get real time facts and BS within seconds! And here's what it boils down to: Knowing your limitations!

Many times when you ride with your friends or somebody you don't know, do you ever try to ride to their skill levels. Be it more advanced than you or below yours? Even though I've been riding 40 plus years I've been smart enough to know my limitations. With years of dirt and street riding experience I've always found people with greater skills than mine, I've been tested and through experience knew when to pull back. This has saved me more times than I can think of. When I was younger I was more daring to the point of recklessness, after a few shall we say mishaps, I've learned the hard way. I was very fortunate nothing serious ever happened to me or the bike I was riding. As I gravitated to the next level and so on, I've used my experience to help me keep two wheels on the road. The first thing I realized was the type of bike I had versus my friends, be it a touring type of bike or a sport bike, I know that one does has an advantage going through the hills versus just cruising. As my youth left me years ago, I'm a different rider today, I do push myself sometimes, but my brain kicks in and lets me know how far I can go and sometimes I can almost regret what I just did or be just thankful for what I didn't do. I guess I'll chock it up to experience.

It seems like the best rides I've been on are not the ones with just straight lines, it's all about the twisties, the mountain treks and so on. I don't get mad at the hot rodders or crazy riders, I just let them pass me and God willing I'll see them at the top or bottom on two wheels that is. I don't care if they smack talk me about how safe I ride, be it Grandpa style or whatever they say, I know how good of a rider that I am and at the end of the day that's what matters the most. I know I can lean and scrape the foot pegs through the twisties, burn rubber, wheelies and a few other things, but I also know when to do them and that wisdom has prolonged my riding life.

One more important thing as well as knowing your riding skills and level, you can be a super safe rider with an abundance of respect on the road, but always make sure your bike is in great riding condition - looks don't matter. Go through your bike regularly, making sure nothing of importance has vibrated off or is about to be vibrated off to include expensive decorative chrome parts! It doesn't require much time to do and it could save your life as well as replacing parts. And don't forget to always check your tire pressure!
