

ple seem to think it is their right to shake the windows in every home or business they pass. Now that attitude is biting us all as there is serious movement afoot to institute new noise requirements. The American Motorcycle Association (AMA) has developed model legislation for municipalities to use to "adopt fair and objective" laws relating to motorcycle noise. The Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) have developed a new Standard J2825, which establishes instrumentation, test site, test conditions, procedures, measurement and sound level limits which are part of the model legislation. The ABATE PAC Committee will have to delineate an official position with regard to noise legislation, as the issue is too hot to ignore.

On a personal note: I want to say thank you to the many people who have been so supportive and have provided constructive input to the PAC and the Board while I have served in these positions. I have always tried to make sure that all perspectives were heard and al-

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lowed the PAC Committee to be the guiding force for the PAC. The Legislature returned in mid October to more Special Sessions called by Governor Schwarzenegger. He has called *twelve*, so far, in his tenure as Governor. This is the most by any recent Governor in California's history. The budget crises have been the main reason for calling these sessions, but water, education funding and others have popped up as well. And, experts are predicting even more with all the spending cuts and state employee furloughs, the state may already be down another \$1 billion, or so, in income from their predictions when they passed the last fix-it budget in August.

I am watching all these Special Session activities, since our motorcycle smog inspection/noise bill could be inserted into any legislation during one of these deliberations. I would, of course, send out an immediate alert should this have enough to deal with, and will leave cluding the upcoming election in Assemus alone until next year.



Tom Lubbers has been a motorcycle enthusiast all his life and an ABATE member for several years. He currently serves as



Remember last month when I reported on the Los Angeles City Council being asked by Senator Fran Pavley to pass a resolution supporting the Motorcycle Smog Check Bill, SB435? The first meeting resulted in the resolution being tabled as the City Council members wanted more info from agencies like the Air Quality Management District. The second meeting was after the deadline for October's Bailing Wire, so I thought I'd bring you up to date.

At a late September Los Angeles City Council meeting the resolution was brought up again. The City Council had 'discovered' that the bill, SB435, would very likely be amended when reintroduced in 2010. They thought it would be inappropriate to vote on the resolution under those circumstances. The resolution was withdrawn and there was no vote.

Gee, I wonder if our phone calls, letters, faxes, and emails had anything to do with them 'discovering' that the bill would likely be amended? Again, thanks to those that discovered this resolution was being introduced before the City Council.

Thanks to those that attended the City Council meetings, especially the first one as there was only a two day notice. Thanks to all that phoned, faxed, wrote letters, and emailed the members of the City Council between the first and second meeting.



I am sure some of the City Council members remembered us. One member ran for State Senate some years ago and beat his powerful incumbent opponent by about 100 votes. We worked for him in that campaign and I'm sure more than 100 motorcyclists in his district voted for him. Then there is a member who participated in a parade around a district where he was campaigning for a colleague. We led that parade. Then there is a member who came to an ABATE meeting seeking our support and we gave it to him. Then there is a member who has worked with an ABATE member on non-motorcycle issues and was willing to listen due to their mutual respect.

ABATE of California must get back to 'basics'. 2010 is an election year and we must work campaigns. If I had to decide to work campaigns or introduce a bill to amend the helmet law, I would choose the former. When the time comes those

elected will remember who 'worked their campaigns'.





WORLDWIDE MOTORCYCLE SALES

PROJECTED TO RISE: Global demand for motorcycles, including electric bicycles and mopeds, is forecast to increase 7.6% per million units by 2013. "This growth is being fueled by rising standards of living in developing parts of the world, making motorcycles a more affordable alternative to walking, bicycling or using mass transit," states a recent study of the worldwide motorcycle market.

Sales value will expand at a slower pace, climbing 7.2 percent annually to \$66.6 billion in 2013, because of an expected decline in sales-weighted prices due to fast market growth in low priced electric motorcycles and smaller internal combustion engine (ICE) motorcycles. These and other trends, including market share and product segmentation, are presented in "World Motorcycles", an industry analysis released September 23 by The Freedonia Group, Inc., a Cleveland-based international business research firm.

The study forecasts that electric motorcycles, which are extremely popular in China, but account for a minimal share of demand in most other parts of the world, will register the strongest market advances. Sales of battery-powered bicycles, scooters and other two-wheelers will be driven by their generally lower purchase prices, low cost of operation and lack of harmful emissions. However, ICE motorcycles will continue to account for more than 95% of all demand outside of China in 2013.







Lane Sharing - or Lane Splitting - is not legal because it is not mentioned in the California Vehicle Code, and it is not illegal because it is not specifically prohibited in the Vehicle Code. For many motorcyclists throughout the country, from that standpoint, we're the envy of the nation. Some of the violations that we can be cited for when we are splitting are: 1] "speed too fast for conditions" - Although it is not written anywhere, most law enforcement officers will not bother you if you are moving at 10 – 15 MPH faster than the traffic you are splitting. Some police in town consider any lane splitting on city streets to be "too fast for conditions".

2] Then there's "unsafe lane change" or "changing lanes without a signal" - You can get those if you are popping back and forth from lane to lane to lane, instead of just sharing a lane. 3] "Following too close" while you are setting up for a move - Following too close to allow safe reaction time is always unsafe. 4] Then there is the catch-all of "improper passing". And 5] the most severe is "reckless driving" which happens when a combination of laws are being broken.



Tires - Part II

Last month we covered some basic maintenance issues and touched on a few points for tire selection. This column will address tire size data and define a few terms as well.

There are three common tire size systems. Metric (i.e. 130/90-16), Alpha (i.e. MT90HB16), and Inch (5.00H16). For comparative purposes, the following chart shows the equivalent between the three. Be advised! This does not imply interchangeability. Check with a reputable shop, your service literature, or manufacturers' data for specific applications.
