

Lobbyist's Report

May is Motorcycle Awareness month. A motorcycle safety message will be posted on the CMS (Changeable Message Signs), May 8th - 11th. A message will also appear on June 15th, which is "Ride your Motorcycle to Work Day".

It's crunch time for the state Legislature. *Why?* Because the deadline for bills moving through their first Policy Committee was over in April. This month (May) is when bills must try to escape the Appropriations Committee's Suspense file. Bills that cost more than \$150,000 are moved to the suspense file until after the state's budget is passed.

The Appropriations Committee then knows how much money is left over for allocation to fiscal/cost bills, before sending these bills to the full floor for votes!

The two bills we are working on are AB 51, the Lane Splitting Bill, introduced by Assemblymen Bill Quirk (D-Hayward) and Tom Lackey (R-Palmdale) and AB 334 (Ken Cooley, D- Rancho Cordova) that deals with motorcyclist profiling. Both bills are currently in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 51 was heard in the Assembly Transportation

Committee on April 6th On behalf of ABATE, I testified, along with the AMA's rep, and questioned the restrictive speed limits imposed by the bill when lane splitting. The Chairman, Jim Frasier, who rides a Harley, questioned Assemblyman Quirk and the proposed low speed limit when lane splitting, because of the wobbling effect that can occur at low speeds. He also questioned the *LOW maximum* speed in AB 51 and indicated that this might be too low, as well. Other members of the Committee had similar friend-ly-to-motorcyclist questions.

The bill was passed out to the Assembly Appropriations Committee on the condition that Assemblyman Quirk work out the differences with motorcyclists and their advocacy groups in the Appropriations Committee. I also proposed an amendment, that was approved by our Leg/PAC Committee, to his office prior to the hearing, which proposed **NO** speed restriction when lane splitting. This amendment was rejected by Assemblyman Quirk. **Stay tuned!** We may need a call to action on this bill if it does not meet with our approval.

The second bill is AB 334 by Assemblyman Cooley, which I testified in support of, along with the AMA and BRO, in the Public Safety Committee. The bill was amended and I am awaiting a review of the ABATE Leg/PAC Committee as to our continued support. Our position is support until, or if, the Leg/ PAC Committee decides to take a different position.

The new President pro Tem of the Senate, Kevin De Leon (D-Los Angeles), has introduced SB 350 which is the latest bill to seriously deal with climate control and greenhouse gases. The bill is currently directed at fixed sources of pollution. However, the bill does allow the Air Resources Board (CARB) to re-evaluate its current air pollution regulations on autos, trucks and all types of motorcycles! We need to watch for provisions that would lower motorcycle engine emission standards, or other restrictions.

I look forward to seeing you at the ABATE Board and Leg/PAC meetings in Fresno on May 30th!

Thank you, as always, for contributing to the dedicated Lobbyist fund to keep me in the Capital fighting for your riding rights!





As usual we are seeing amendments and the corresponding rider confusion and concerns as the motorcycle bills we are monitoring in Sacramento move through the legislative process. Sometimes I wonder if amendments are purposely written to try to confuse the "Average Joe" on the street and keep all of us "off- guard" while a bill makes its way through the process of becoming state law. Fortunately we have a full time Lobbyist, Legislative Director, and well educated riders in ABATE that analyze and scrutinize every piece of motorcycle legislation that is introduced in Sacramento.

At this time our PAC is still in full support of AB 334 (even with the amended language) and we are still opposed to AB 51 because of

the speed limitations written into that bill's language. If our PAC becomes aware of any significant changes to either bill our members will be notified immediately and, if needed, a new PAC vote will be taken to see where we will stand on each bill.

Again, we are still in a monitoring mode on Both AB 334 and AB 51, and our PAC positions have not changed on either bill at the time of this article. If you are not receiving our email information, please contact Carol Cromwell at our ABATE State Office and update your personal contact information so we can keep you current with these bills, any issues that may arise or necessary actions needed from our members as the bills make their way through the legislature.





by Norm e. Newiger, Safety Officer Good Times Ahead

May is Motorcycle Awareness Month. For drivers that means being reminded to be aware of motorcycles. For bike riders it can also mean being aware of your bikes. How clean is your bike? Does your chrome sparkle? Did you spend hours cleaning your spokes? Is your paint job waxed out and so slippery that dusts rolls off? Sometimes my bike looks as fantastic at 2 feet as well as 15 feet away! Just by looking at it makes me think, NICE !!! But, how safe is it? Being roadworthy is what is most important to me rather than how nice it looks. The good looks are secondary, it's the nuts and guts which rank number one with me. I've always said that, when you detail your bike (not the quick run thru) have your tools with you as well. It's a great time to be intimate with your bike especially this time of the year.

As our weather begs us to ride we must insure to ourselves that our bike is so safe that we can only blame forces out of our control, i.e. accidents, no matter who's at fault! There is the mechanical failure possibility though, but the odds are in our favor, here's why: As a rider of the V-Twin my main responsibility is making sure that it's in top condition to the best of my ability. I cannot afford to have a mechanic to go thru my bike periodically to make sure it's in tip-top shape. I have them work on what I cannot do or don't want to do, therefore, I know my limitations. The most important things are the little ones that matter, visual inspection is as important as tightening loose nuts and bolts.

I cannot count how many nuts, bolts, hex heads, Phillip heads, etc. that's on my bike. Let's just say it's never ending! When I go thru my bike I use the term zones, i.e. tires, handle bars, right side, left side, frame, engine and drive chain. I go thru the zones so as to not miss anything. It's my checklist, my way of doing it and at my age I need to re-assure myself that all things are really done. In my way of thinking, this is where Safety is First! Have you ever had one of your mirrors start flapping or cart wheeling while you're riding? How about a turn signal knocking on your knee cap? These little things can distract you as well as piss you off. I even had my gear shifting knob disappear once and that really sucks! I then wished that I would have checked these things out before I rode.

I'm not saying to go thru your bike thoroughly every time. Sometimes a quick visual inspection can prevent things from happening. As I was detailing my bike, wiping down my clutch cable, I noticed wear at the middle section where the fork lock is, it was rubbing against the cable and was ready to sever the line. Having a broken clutch cable while riding truly sucks! After many years of servicing my bike as I detail it, I kind of know what nuts, bolts pretty much hold their own and which need occasional at-



tention. It's usually the cosmetic things we add that need the most attention, but then again, anything on a V-twin can and will loosen up at any given time!

Let's go back to the broken clutch cable thing, this happens! The best thing to do is not go into a panic mode no matter how fast you are going. Then the next thing to do is maintain control, you can still downshift or up shift, it might require a little extra umpf, but it can be done. If you're riding and doing - let's say 50 mph - and your cable breaks, you need to look for a safe place to pull over, not necessarily an emergency type of scenario in which you need to stop immediately, but you can gradually downshift and brake to a stop. The worst thing to do is panic and lock your brakes. You can up shift to neutral as you are stopping, just remember if you're in 3rd or 4th gear and come to a stop (with no clutch) your bike could be like riding a bull, jerking you as you are stopping and this could be difficult on a full dresser.

When I was a dirt bike freak, I only used my clutch when idling, slow riding or getting ready to pop a wheelie; speed shifting meant no clutch, up or down! I still do brag somewhat about my dirt bike riding experience, it really translated to street riding as far as having the confidence and discipline to react to whatever riding on the street would bring forth.

Visual inspection is important, it could lead you into getting your hands dirty. How often do you check your tires? Do you roll your bike to inspect the tires 360 degrees? Or are you satisfied with what you see when it's parked? Do you look for improper wear or fatigue? How old are your tires? If you ride 3 to 6 thousand miles a year, the treads might look good, but are your tires hard or dried out and showing signs of cracking? Tire pressure! After all is said and done proper tire pressure can save your life, period! Don't be lazy or think it's okay just because your tires look good, just do it. A flat tire on the side of the road is just a bad as a broken clutch cable.

You can easily inspect your disc brakes for even wear. That's just too easy to do, but really important. Remember them old brake drums? You had to do some major work before you could inspect them visually and now days it's right there in front of you with easy access.

As I wrote this article, I had turned on my bike several times and let it idle to see and feel the vibrations on my '95 Softail. In my mind I see vibrations as a point of release for energy, therefore loosening points of contact of metal on metal. To me it's like an earthquake at 4.2 on the Richter scale, smoothing out as the RPMs increase, and that's a beautiful thing about the V-twin. Therefore preventative maintenance is a safety issue, because what you want to do is eliminate liabilities that could happen. Have you ever ridden with your buds and all of a sudden you see a chrome flash? Have you and or your bike been tagged by chrome flying objects? I have a friend who caught a passenger foot peg with his teeth; I thought he was a hockey player! True story. We have been littering the highways with our aftermarket chrome parts for years. I honestly got tired of replacing the missing parts and what chrome is left on my bike is all the chrome that's left. By-the-way if anyone sees a rear chrome axle cover (westbound) on the 118 fwy between Granada Hills and Moorpark, it's mine, contact me!

One item on my safety checklist is the welds, a good visual inspection is fast and easy. A good welding job on your frame can last a lifetime, but sometimes things get old and the repetitive vibrations can cause failure. It could be very tiny at first and progress over the years or bam! It could be broke all of a sudden. My friend's Wide Glide with a rubber mounted engine had broken weld issues, the way his engine bounces when idling darn near hypnotized me. If it weren't for the fact that I removed his seat and gas tank while doing some work on his bike, I would never had seen the cracks.

The last and biggest thing I do once a year is this: I remove my seat and gas tank and inspect the gas lines and wiring that I cannot see or feel without removing said such items. It does take some time to do this, but because of the way my bike is built there is contact and vibration going on under these items. I usually replace the gas lines because it's easy at that point. I look for wear and tear on the exposed wiring, it's definitely tight in those areas, but I look for possible bare wires and burnt spots. I don't want to have electrical issues while riding, instant power loss is not good, especially if you're cruising on a freeway! I look for indentations on the wires to make sure that I don't find a break in the wire (everyone's nightmare!) or one that will break soon, making sure all wires are tucked in and properly installed. You also have great access at this time to inspect welds, the top of your engine and any nuts or bolts etc. that you wouldn't ordinarily see.

Why is Preventative Maintenance a part of my safety program? I want to have good time while riding, I want everyone to have a good time riding. When you know your bike is up to your standards of being safe to ride you will have a good time riding. We all know stuff happens, but was it preventable? That's on you. We have a great season of riding ahead of us, let's all enjoy it and ride safer than last time.

AIM & NCOM FOUNDER RICHARD M. LESTER IN-DUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME

Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (A.I.M.) and the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM) and affiliated & supported groups and organizations, extend Congratulations to founder Richard M. Lester on his recent induction into the Freedom Fighters Hall of Fame.

The Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame has announced their 2015 inductees into the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum Hall of Fame and one into the Freedom Fighters Hall of Fame. Lester, a California attorney who founded AIM & NCOM three decades ago and numerous subsequent motorcycle outreach groups, is the first national bikers' rights attorney to be inducted.

"The Sturgis Motorcycle Hall of Fame is designed to recognize individuals or groups who have made a long term positive impact on the motorcycle community," said museum Executive Director Christine Paige Diers. "The Freedom Fighters Hall of Fame recognizes the commitment and sacrifices individuals across the nation, and world, have made to protect the rights of motorcyclists, and who have made a significant impact through their work in grassroots rights efforts.

Richard became an attorney at the ripe age of 45. While in law school he realized that motorcycle riders were an unrepresented group who didn't have a voice. His love for the sport prompted him to focus on the need of a voice in the motorcycling community. In 1982 after passing the bar, his work for motorcycling began. It took him a couple of years to organize a team of attorneys who rode motorcycles, and who also had an understanding of what was needed in the motorcycle community and how to go about finding the voice that was needed.

Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (AIM) was founded in 1984, and is a legal protection program that is free for all motorcycle riders, providing free medical information and emergency contact of next-of-kin. To date, over 2 million cards have been distributed nationwide, with A.I.M. attorneys in every state providing legal services for riders and doing pro-bono (free) work within the motorcycle community.

The following year, in 1985 Richard Lester founded the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM) to provide a much-needed voice for the motorcycling community. Today NCOM is a national organization with over 2,400 motorcycle groups and organizations that have joined together as a whole to tackle the legal and legislative aspect of motorcycle riding.

Today, more than 30 years later, Richard is still working hard for the motorcycling community. He has attorneys in every state, and has also founded three (3) additional organizations so that every motorcycle rider has a voice. One program is the Confederation of Clubs, which is comprised of motorcycle clubs, from 1% ers to family



clubs. The Christian ministry sector came together in 2005 to form Christian Unity to improve networking with both secular and Christian bike groups. And the newest addition is the National Sports Bike Association, the sport bike division of NCOM to have a clear and unadulterated voice directly from the Sport Bike Community on issues that directly affect them.

"Richard has dedicated his life to the lifestyle of motorcycling and has contributed so much of his time and effort, not to mention the financial investment he has donated to the cause," reads his nomination for the Freedom Fighter Hall of Fame. "He is the only attorney who has always, and continues, to give back to the motorcycling community by creating five (5) FREE and useful national programs, and by hosting many conventions and seminars to educate and inform all motorcyclists of their right to ride.'

Individuals chosen for induction into the Sturgis Motorcycle Hall of Fame and the Freedom Fighters Hall of Fame will be honored at the annual induction breakfast ceremony on Wednesday, August 5, 2015, at The Lodge at Deadwood during the 75th anniversary of the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally. This event is open to the public and tickets are available at www.sturgismuseum.com/hall-of-fame/ freedom-fighters, or by calling (605) 347-2001.

SOUTH DAKOTA RAISES SPEED LIMITS IN TIME FOR STURGIS

South Dakota became the latest state to kick up the speed limit, as an amendment to Senate Bill 1 passed on March 24, 2015 changing the speed limit on the state's two interstate highways. The new law took effect on April 1 (no joke), so you'll legally be able to travel at 80 mph on the I-90 and I-29, meaning that motorists and bikers going to the 75th Anniversary Sturgis Rally will arrive a little bit faster.

States across the country have been raising their speed limits as lawmakers argue that roads and cars are safer. Idaho, Wyoming and Utah have already raised their limits to 80 mph; on one toll road in Texas, it's 85.

CONGRESSIONAL MEASURE WOULD CREATE AUTOCYCLE" VEHICLE CLASS

With a growing number of 3-wheeled vehicles hitting the marketplace, Congress seeks to create a new classification of vehicles to be designated as "Autocycles". Previously, these types of vehicles have been classified as motorcycles, so Senator David Vitter (R-LA) has introduced the Autocycle Safety Act, S. 685, to create their own new category and require the new class of three-wheeled enclosed vehicles to meet both motorcycle safety standards as well as certain passenger vehicle standards.

3-wheelers are currently exempt from many state and federal rules that dictate safety and emissions standards that apply to cars, but the new category created under S.685 would impose many rules on manufacturers by the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA): including automotive standards for seating systems, seat belts, child restraints, air bags, roof crush resistance, and flame-resistant interiors; as well as motorcycle standards covering brakes, lights, rims and tires, controls and displays, and glazing materials.

NEW JERSEY BANS MOTORCYCLE-ONLY CHECK-POINTS

On March 23, 2015 New Jersey Governor Christie signed into law a piece of legislation (A-2316/S-1614) prohibiting law enforcement agencies from conducting roadside checkpoints or systematic inspections that focus only on motorcycles. It will not prevent any other type of road block or checkpoint that is for a valid law enforcement purpose, but it must include vehicles of all types, not just motorcycles-only. This law goes into effect immediately.

ABATE of the Garden State, worked with the legisla-

tors from District 1 (Cape May) and was successful in getting the bill introduced in February of 2014. In February 2015 it passed both houses of the legislature with unanimous votes from both chambers.

Many NJ motorcycle riders wrote, called and emailed their legislators to ask for their support on this important legislation. "This new law will prohibit the unlawful practice of profiling a whole class of motorists simply because of their chosen, and legal mode of transportation", says Jim Parker, Legislative Coordinator for ABATE of the Garden State.

RED LIGHT LAW PASSED IN KENTUCKY

Kentucky Governor Steve Beshear signed HB 370 on April 2nd that allows a motorcycle to proceed through a red light if it fails to operate after 2 minutes or 2 cycles of the light with no other oncoming traffic.

The Kentucky Motorcycle Association pushed for the legislation, which it says is needed because the lower weight of motorcycles sometimes means that traffic light sensors embedded in roads don't detect them, meaning lights do not change.

House Bill 370, sponsored by Rep. Johnny Bell (D-Glasgow) and Rep. Wilson Stone (D-Scottsville) creates an affirmative defense against a traffic violation for entering or crossing an intersection against a steady red light for a person operating a motorcycle.

An affirmative defense is "a defense in which the defendant introduces evidence, which, if found to be credible, will negate criminal or civil liability, even if it is proven that the defendant committed the alleged acts," which in this case applies if a motorcycle is brought to a complete stop, the traffic control signal shows a steady red light for two minutes or if the traffic control signal completes two lighting cycles and if the traffic control signal appears to be malfunctioning or doesn't detect the arrival of a motorcycle. Another condition of the defense is that no person or motor vehicle is approaching the intersection or that any approaching person or motor vehicle is so far from the intersection that it does not constitute an immediate hazard.

Jay Huber, president of the Kentucky Motorcycle Association, said the longer motorcyclists remain at a light, the longer they are a target for inattentive drivers. "It becomes an issue of safety," he said.

BILL WOULD REQUIRE MOTORCYCLE LICENSE IN ALABAMA

Legislators in Alabama, the only State in the Union that doesn't require a motorcycle license or endorsement, are considering legislation to end that distinction. An oversight in the 1990s led to a gap in the law that allows anyone 16 and older with a regular driver's license to also operate a motorcycle in the state.

If enacted, the new law would require operators to pass a knowledge test to obtain a Class M endorsement, and the bill also authorizes police officers to write a ticket if you are riding a motorcycle without a license. 40 states require a skills test for a motorcycle license, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures, but that's not likely to happen anytime soon in Alabama.

Political insiders indicate the bill is likely to reach Governor Bentley's desk, who is expected to sign it into law.

TEXAS BIKE BILL REQUIRES 3-FOOT CLEARANCE FROM DRIVERS

A new bill could mean new rules for Texas drivers. House Bill 2459 states that drivers would have to give pedestrians, bicyclists and motorcyclists three feet when passing or turning. HB 2459 was heard in the Texas House Transportation Committee for "unprotected road users," and if passed a violation would be a Class B Misdemeanor.

"At this point, I'm excited with three feet, anything is better than zero feet. We're just waiting to see whether or not Governor Greg Abbott ratifies that bill," cyclist Les Akins told Newschannel 6, adding that he hopes HB 2459 will raise awareness.

CALIFORNIA HIT-AND-RUN BILL PASSES COM MITTEE

A "Hit & Run" bill supported by ABATE of California has passed out of the Assembly Transportation Committee. The measure would authorize the use of the existing Emergency Alert System communication equipment to notify and alert law enforcement and the general public when a serious hit and run traffic event has occurred. Prompt public distribution of this important information could help prevent further incidents and accelerate apprehension of involved parties.

AB 8 sponsor Assemblyman Mike Gatto (D-Glendale) "Personally thanked US for our support," said ABATE Lobbyist Jim Lombardo who testified in support of the measure. "Nice Victory, and good for us/ABATE to testify in committee on behalf of a safety measure."




