

Very rarely lately have we seen any good news about motorcycle riders, so I want to give a "Thumb's Up" to Johnny Wolf, aka "Diesel", who is President of Dynasty M/C and gives back to his community by coaching kid's sports teams. Diesel played baseball and football all the way through college and later he competed in and trained mixed martial arts fighters as the owner of four MMA gyms. Diesel says he doesn't remember all of his teachers but he never forgot any of his coaches.

As his way of giving back Diesel now coaches youth football and baseball teams in his community. Diesel coached two baseball teams this year, a Junior 90's team of 14 year olds and a AAA team of 10 year olds. Both of his teams finished in first place and his AAA "Royals" won their League Play-off and the Tournament of Champions. This is the first time that has ever happened in the history of the league.

Coaching requires no less than 15 hours a week of Diesel's time and when he's not coaching he continues to give back by performing maintenance work on the fields, keeping score books, or cleaning up and properly disposing of trash and debris at the field sites.

When Diesel started his M/C club he made a list of priorities for himself, his members, and their families, and those values and priorities have served him, his club, and his community well.

I would like to say "Thank You" from ABATE of California for your dedication to motorcycling and for making such a positive impact on the kids and families of your community.

ABATE knows our motorcycle riders come from all walks of life and many of them have made a beneficial impact on their communities. I think it's about time ABATE uses some of our news articles to "educate" the general public and make them aware of the talent, dedication, and hard work our riders perform in the communities they live in and visit. 

Lobbyist's Report


The Legislature is finally out on Summer Recess! Before heading out for a month-long vacation, the Legislature acted on many bills! One piece of legislation important to us, however, they postponed until next year! AB 51 by Assemblyman Bill Quirk, that would codify motorcycle lane splitting, was made into a two-year

After numerous meetings with ABATE and other rider groups, Quirk put AB 51 over until **NEXT YEAR!** He said he wanted to continue to meet with the motorcycle rider groups to see if he can work out the problems in his bill. As more discussions took place, doubts also began to surface about how, or if, the law could be effectively and safely enforced by (also lane splitting) law enforcement officers.

One of the bills that continues to make its way through the Legislature, as this article is written, is Assemblyman Mike Gatto's ABATEendorsed AB 8 that would, among other important things, use the freeway message signs to assist in apprehending alleged hit and run drivers. I spoke in support of the measure, on July 14, and AB 8 passed out of the Senate Public Safety Committee with ABATE's help.

Governor Brown has called a Special Legislative Session to work on raising funding to fix the road repair problems, accumulated over decades, that so many of us are aware of as highway travelers. There are many proposals for the fixes and I am watching them very closely to see how the expected tax increases will affect us as motorcyclist users of the state's streets and highways!

Thank you for the continued support of the dedicated Lobbyist Fund to keep me in the Capital fighting for your rights!





This month's PAC report is going to cover the subject that we always seem to be talking about and that, as usual, is funding for our various ABATE accounts. The primary account that our organization exists off of is our General Fund. This account pays for our day to day operating expenses and if it ever goes dry ABATE of California and all of our Locals will be forced to shut down and then disappear like dust in the wind.

The next crucial account is our Lobbyist Fund. This account is used to pay our Lobbyist, Jim Lombardo. Jim has represented ABATE for many years and is well known in our state capitol for his dedication to motorcycle rights and motorcycle legislation. ABATE has been very successful in introducing and passing motorcycle related legislation and our members should be both aware of, and proud of, our success and Jim's service. We have established a proven political track record in introducing and passing "good" bills, and sometimes even "stopping" perceived negative legislation that affects motorcycling

Over the years Jim Lombardo has successfully advised us and helped us guide our organization and our members through the halls of our state leg-

islature and the legislative process. He has been one of the main reasons ABATE is respected and well known in those capitol hallways and we owe our success to Jim's experience and our members' dedication, hard work, and perseverance.

ABATE PAC and our PAC Fund was set up years ago so our organization could become politically active in California. ABATE of California's incorporation documents do not legally allow our organization to be politically active, employ a paid Lobbyist, or to collect or donate funds to political candidates in California. That is why we have a registered California Political Action Committee (PAC) and comply with all of the mandatory California Secretary of State filings, rules and regulations. Monies deposited in this account are used for contributions to state candidates and cannot be used for any other purpose.

So, there you have a quick overview of our ABATE funding accounts and I'm going to again ask every Local and individual ABATE member who can donate to those accounts to please do so. Right now we need donations for the Lobbyist and General Funds. Our PAC Fund is doing OK at this time because we are not in an election year cycle.

I know it seems like we are continuously asking for funding, but ABATE does not have a statewide fundraiser this year (such as the bike raffle, etc) and funding has been down from most of our Locals this year. At your next meeting ask your Local Officers what amount, if any, has been donated to our State Funds in 2015 and then discuss if anything more can be sent in at this time. ABATE relies heavily on your generosity and donations to keep our State Funds operating, let's not allow them to become dust in the wind!


The next things coming up are the ABATE State Run in Kernville and Local 38's anniversary party.



RIP BRIAN "BRIMAN" WASSELL

March 6, 1959 – June 28, 2015

It is with great sadness I announce the passing of Brian Scott Wassell. Brian was killed in an auto accident early Sunday morning, June 28, 2015. It was a single vehicle accident and he was pronounced dead at the scene.

Brian was very well known in the biker community, his late father, Richard, had started the Ride Line, which Brian re-started with the modern day technology of the internet. He did this over the years with selfless dedication, going to clubs, organizations and events and passing out his card so he could list riding events on the Ride Line. 





Motorcycle Safety Report

Hot Weather is Fun!

Yes it is that time of the year – HOT, HOT, HOT! July through September cooks in So Cal and with our water shortage and sweltering weather we do have to be cautious about riding in certain areas. From the hot black asphalt in the valleys to the deserts low and high you can cook yourself and/or your bike - fast! I sometimes ride in the San Fernando Valley and that asphalt gets so hot it softens up somewhat, and all that oil and engine crap in the middle of the lane gets gooey and very slippery, so watch out!

I'm doing a little re-write on this subject to refresh everyone who reads this. Age is a major factor with any type of heat wave, whether you are riding or just out enjoying the summer months. If you or any of your riding buddies are in the so called senior years you have to watch yourself or them and vice versa the buddy system. It is a known fact that the elderly, as well as infants and children, are more susceptible to heat related illnesses. This also includes adults who are under many different types of treatments or have a chronic illness.

Have you ever been riding in hot weather and started to feel lightheaded, a little faint, or maybe tired and/or weak all of a sudden? How about getting a headache or hallucinating as well? If so, any of these conditions could lead you into making a life threatening decision for you and/or a friend! Riding in hot weather (90+ degrees) can be a challenge to your body without you knowing it.

Your body has natural means of regulating its own temperature, but failure to do so in the face of extreme heat is called Heat Stroke! Depending on the severity it could lead to organ damage and possible death. **Everyone** is susceptible. It doesn't matter if you are in a desert, jungle, mountains or in your backyard! It doesn't matter if you're walking, jogging, doing yard work, working out doors or even riding your bike. You could be in the shade or on a hot tin roof, Heat Exhaustion can and does happen - real quick if you're not paying attention to your body. Heat waves result in more deaths in the USA than hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, lightning, and earthquakes combined.

Here are some examples of possible Heat Exhaustion/Heat Stroke symptoms: Headache, nausea, muscle cramps, profuse sweating, dizziness, confusion, exhaustion, high body temperature, rapid heart beat, dry skin and hallucinations. Some symptoms can be more prevalent than others, everybody's body is different, and the location where you are plays a part, too. You also have to factor in your medical condition. Certain medications you are on play a big roll in how your body re-acts to hot weather. For example: I have a thyroid issue and riding in hot weather is a big deal to me.

Heat Exhaustion can progress to Heat Stroke when the body's temperature regulation fails. The affected individual develops a change in mental status, becomes confused, lethargic and may have a seizure,







the skin stops sweating and the body temperature may exceed 106 F (41 C). This is a life threatening condition and emergency medical attention is needed immediately.

If you, or someone you are with, are experiencing any of these symptoms here's what you should do: Get yourself or the person into a cool shady area or an air conditioned building, remove clothing to include boots and socks and apply cool water to the skin or, if possible, a cool bath or shower. Possibilities are endless but sometimes you have to use what you have where you are. Even a cool concrete floor helps. You can accelerate body cooling by using a fan to blow cool air on the person. Drinking cool water will help with hydration and certain sports drinks can help as well.

Riding in hot weather above 90 degrees can be dangerous if not properly addressed. You could be riding and not notice any sweat on your arms or head, but you have to think about evaporation as you ride (remember dry skin). You could be blow drying yourself at any speed and this is very misleading to your brain because other symptoms may happen in due time when you think everything is all right. Wearing shorts, no helmet, or no shirt will not make you any cooler than if you were fully dressed. In fact it's better if you know you are sweating than not knowing, i.e. you sweat because your body is trying to cool down and now you know it. At this point you can make a decision to prevent Heat Exhaustion or Heat Stroke.

If you, or anyone riding with you, feel unsure about yourself or another person, always call 911 as the severity of Heat Exhaustion may be unknown at the time and it's better to be safe than sorry.

Hot weather truths or myths, for example:

#1 – Mesh gear will keep you cooler: Yes and no is the right answer! Mesh gear will keep you cooler to a certain degree and provide just a little relief from the heat if the temperate zone is in the 80s, but in the 90s it's a different story. Riding in temperatures in the 90s won't provide any cool options with which your thyroid can work with (your thyroid regulates

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your body temperature). While riding in temperatures at about 90 plus degrees you need some skin surface moisture (sweat) and some air. Remember this, lots of hot air and no skin moisture is potentially a very bad thing that can happen to anyone. It could lead to dehydration and or Heat Exhaustion/Heat Stroke. As you ride with mesh type clothing on your body, the air is quickly wicking away any moisture coming to the surface of the skin which will leave you dry and hot!

#2 - While riding with no shirt or sleeveless type clothing and no helmet will not keep you cooler (you see this all the time - mostly male riders), it could promote dehydration and Heat Exhaustion faster. Plus you can get sun burnt and this will raise your body temperature as well. Keeping your skin covered will help reduce the chances of skin cancer down the road if in fact you do this quite often. Sweating is good moisture is released through the surface of your skin and transfers excess heat away from you via the needed air flow.

#3 – Will a cool wet neck tie or wrap cool me down? Yes and No is partially correct but No is truer! While riding in real hot weather a neck tie/wrap cools you down just a little bit and it might feel good but your body is still hot - the body's core is what is really hot, from your shoulders to your waistline. If your body's core is hot and I mean Hot then the blood moving to all your extremities is overheated. You need relief at the core not your neck! An evaporative type of cooling vest that allows you to control airflow will assist your thyroid and body with keeping your blood at a far more acceptable temperature than any type of wet neck tie or wrap. Try it, your body will thank you.

neck tie or wrap. Try it, your body will thank you. # 4 - Can you drink too much water? Yes, drinking a lot of water real fast can make you sick at first so be careful on your intake. You should drink water continuously throughout the day. When you are riding in extreme hot weather pull over and drink water often, even if you feel okay. You have to be smart and remember that everybody's body is different You might be feeling okay, but the other person(s) may not. The worst that could happen is that you pee more and that's better than being whisked away in an ambulance with intravenous lines in your body. Yes, you do need electrolytes in your body while sweating your ass off! But be careful of what you put into your body. Sports drinks can help but read the ingredients so you know what you are drinking. A lot of energy drinks pump you up with caffeine and sugar, which promote dehydration, and beer is not the answer, because the alcohol will help in dehydrating your body as well, true! The key word is electrolytes; you can get the sport drinks that provide them as well as additives that you can add to any drink. I know, not drinking ice cold beer is an unpopular answer, but you have to be smart about this and know when it's the proper time

Riding in hot weather is not a bad thing, I love riding in the high desert areas and the views are different and shade is minimal. If you are properly prepared, then it's a fun thing to do. Having common sense is one of the most important things you can possess. If you have saddle bags then use them as a cooler for water or whatever your "smart" drink is. Having extra bottles of water can help out anyone you may see broken down, car or motorcycle. It's a good thing to give some water to someone who's broken down out in the middle of nowhere. Being generous to anybody in time of need is always a great thing and they will remember it! Tell them it's an ABATE thing!

Ride safe, Ride smart, Stay hydrated!



It has been allowed to be only 25 pounds. That means I can carry up to only 25 pounds. They're trying to write something for my slope work. I still don't have the final copy of this yet so for now it's business as usual with the weight and slope work restrictions.

On July 27 I have to go to Kaiser and do a stress test for my heart. It is a 5 hour procedure so I will have to take a day off from work.

Regarding work itself, I have been regulated to being taken in the morning to the job site where I do physical labor (weed eater work, carrying brush etc.) It is classified as arduous work. However on the bright side since I took a driving school refresher course not too long ago, I have been given another shot to try and get the ability to drive county trucks - the small ones S10 Chevys, Ford Rangers, Toyota small pickups and GMC Sonoma. It will be imperative that I pass the test, as it would make things a whole lot easier if I get my driving privilege restored.

A member of our staff, in another department, had a stroke and now is on life support, but I think he will be removed from that soon. Sad, very sad.

ABATE Local 2 member, Brian Wassell, died



in a car crash on the 14 fwy near Aqua Dulce. The accident caused head trauma, which killed him instantly. Also very sad. Brian was the computer guy behind the Ride Line, which was first started by his father. His dad drove an El Camino with a trailer hooked behind the truck. The trailer had a set up that had motorcycle run flyers on it. You could get your run flyer posted and also get free advertisement. A good deal. Brian took over when his father passed away and did it on line for a few years. So once again, sad, really sad.

As of this writing my 2002 883 has been at Casey's MC in Pacoima for 6 months. They have one mechanic so it's kind of slow going. The

good thing is they have not asked for any more money to do additional repairs. As I wrote earlier, I am having the bike made to run better. It has the voyager kit on it and the under carriage is still connected to it. I hope to find out more about the bike this weekend. My other bike, the 1200 L Sporty, I have been riding the piss out of and it had to have the battery replaced. I think the next step is a voltage regulator - maybe this Friday. Riding the bike to work saves me at least 20 minutes on the afternoon commute.

So this Thursday, July 16th, is the Barger HD Bike night. Then on Saturday, July 18th, I hope a group will ride to San Juan Capistrano for the Eagles MC food drive. The band Family Style will be playing - good stuff - from noon to 5 pm. I will still go even if I go solo. Then Sunday is our Local 1 meeting at the Elks Lodge.

Other than riding to work, I have not done much in the way of other stuff biking wise except encouraging my Local 1 to support the various bills we have going via the computer.

So as I close this edition of Sporty's Rides, I will leave you with this: May your ride be safe, your journeys far, your friendships be full of ABATE members and that you are part of the group ABATE that helps fight tooth decay (bad laws from happening to motorcyclists in California).

HAWAII TO ELIMINATE ETHANOL IN GASO

LINE Legislation to repeal the requirement that gasoline offered for sale in Hawaii contain a percentage of ethanol was signed into law by Governor David Ige, and the new law becomes effective December 31, 2015.

The law recognizes that the requirement of blending ethanol into gasoline does not produce any economic benefit for the state and the import of ethanol creates an economic burden for state residents. Ethanol increases water formation, which can then corrode metals and dissolve plastics and rubber, especially over a period of time when the vehicle is not used. Current high-performance specialty parts along with pre-model-year '01 cars and parts may be most susceptible to corrosion, and no motorcycles or ATVs are approved for higher blended fuels. The lifespan of vehicles and equipment can be dramatically reduced with the wrong fuel, and owners could be confronted with breakdowns.

More than a dozen states have ethanol mandates, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures, but only Hawaii and Florida have passed such a repeal. Florida ended its mandate in 2013, the same year the Environmental Protection Agency proposed reducing the amount of ethanol in fuel, acknowledging that a federal push wasn't working as well as expected.

There have been no changes to federal law on the issue since the EPA report, but Pennsylvania Republican Senator Pat Toomey and California Democratic Senator Dianne Feinstein have introduced a bill seeking to repeal the corn ethanol mandate in the federal Renewable Fuel

CALIFORNIA REQUIRES MOTORCYCLISTS TO REMOVE HELMET FOR TRAFFIC STOPS

Known as the "Identity Confirmation Act," Assembly Bill 346 will require a motorist to give law enforcement an unobstructed view of their face during a traffic stop, said California Assemblymember Scott Wilk (R-Santa Clarita), author of the measure which primarily targets motorcycle riders.

The Facial ID bill was inspired by a Simi Valley, CA police officer who told the assemblyman about having cases thrown out of court because he couldn't positively identify someone, Wilk told the Simi Valley Acorn, specifically relating the case of a motorcyclist who refused to remove their helmet.

Wilk admitted to the paper that motorists are compliant 99% of the time, and currently if a driver refuses to show their face during a traffic stop, police can arrest them for resisting or delaying an officer, and can result in going to jail until they can go before a judge.

"From an 'identification' legal view, all citizens are required to prove their identity when asked by law enforcement," said Chuck Pedersen, State Legislative Director for ABATE of California. "From a helmet ticket defense, an officer cannot ask for you to remove your helmet for the purpose of inspection. I don't see a need for this additional legislation."

Nonetheless, AB 346 passed near-unanimously through the State Assembly, was approved by the Senate, and is now headed to Governor Jerry Brown's desk.

HANDLEBAR HEIGHT LIMIT REPEALED IN **SOUTH DAKOTA** Just in time for the 75th Sturgis Rally, starting July 1st, ape-hangers are now legal in South Dakota. The \$20 fine for riding with your hands too high was wiped off the books as Governor Dennis Daugaard signed Senate Bill 85, effectively abolishing South Dakota codified law that prohibited such handlebars.

Until now it was a petty offense in South Dakota if you rode a motorcycle on a public street or highway with the handlebar grips positioned at or above shoulder height, but as of now there are no more regulations on where to hang your hands.

EARPLUGS BENEFICIAL, BUT ILLEGAL FOR OHIO MOTORCYCLISTS Ohio's motorcycle operator

manual says hearing protection, like earplugs, can help reduce noise while allowing a rider to hear important sounds like horns or sirens, but it also says riders should adhere to state laws, which creates a problem: using earplugs in Ohio while operating a vehicle is illegal. There are exceptions for emergency personnel, or road workers, and even for people who wear hearing aids...but not for motorcyclists



It isn't the sound of the motorcycle causing all the noise; 'It's the wind noise that can cause permanent hearing loss," explains A.I.M. Attorney Ralph C. Buss, who has represented the interests of motorcycle riders for over 30 years. "Deafness is a serious problem that people don't think about, don't address," Buss said in an interview with WCPN public radio in Cleveland.

Attorney Buss challenged that law in court. His client: Tom Varsel, who happened to be a retired noise expert for GM who was pulled over for riding his motorcycle in Ohio while wearing earplugs. Varsel was fined \$37, but his case continued to an appellate court. He lost a constitutional challenge to the earplug law, but the case raised interesting issues of health and safety that the court ruled were matters for the legislature to address.

"What's clear is that wind noise on a motorcycle can be very intense, intense enough to damage your hearing," says Eric Healy, a professor of hearing science at the Ohio State University who testified in Varsel's case. "And what's also crystal clear is that earplugs can remedy that, almost completely."

To determine the level of wind noise motorcyclists face, Healy took a recording device for a drive with PhD students. Imagine a mannequin head with anatomically correct ears, stuck out a window, and the measurements recorded from that experiment, Healy says, matched previous work published in well-known British journals in the mid 1990s. He found that at speeds as low as 35 mph, wind noise exceeded 85 decibels.

"Sounds over that are known to cause hearing damage. The levels that we measured were in the range from 110 to 130db," Healy told WCPN radio host Tony Ganzer. Even helmets don't prevent the wind noise, though earplugs offering some 30db of potential reduction, might help.

But the wording of the law in Ohio and other states, which dates back to 1989 and was enacted largely in response to stereo headphones in cars, doesn't allow earplugs to be worn by motorcyclists or motorists.

A similar law in California, which allowed only for "custom earplugs," was amended in 2004, allowing individuals to wear earplugs that don't block the sounds of horns or emergency sirens. Under exceptions to their Headphone and Earplug law, it was added (V C Section 27400): "(d) A person wearing personal hearing protectors in the form of earplugs or molds that are specifically designed to attenuate injurious noise levels. The plugs or molds shall be designed in a manner so as to not inhibit the wearer's ability to hear a siren or horn from an emergency vehicle or a horn from another motor vehicle."

ILLINOIS LIGHTS IT UP A bill in Illinois to legalize accent lighting on motorcycles passed unanimously through the legislative process and on June 18 was sent to the Governor.

HB3944: Amends the Illinois Vehicle Code to provide that a motorcycle may be equipped with auxiliary accent lights, including standard bulb running lights and light emitting diode pods and strips. Provides that the auxiliary accent lights shall not be red or white or oscillating, rotating, or flashing lights. Defines "auxiliary accent light".

- (a) A motorcycle may be equipped with any number of auxiliary accent lights, including standard bulb running lights and light emitting diode pods and strips of various
- (b) The auxiliary accent lights allowed under subsection (a) of this Section shall not be red or white or oscillating, rotating, or flashing lights.
- (c) For the purposes of this Section, "auxiliary accent light" means any lighted lamp or illuminating device placed upon a motorcycle, other than head lamps, spot

lamps, auxiliary driving lamps, signal lamps, or hazard warning lamps.

"Accent lighting are the small colored lights tucked in on the underside of motorcycle gas tanks and frames," explains ABATE of Illinois on their website (www.ABATE-IL. org), which supports the measure. "We are looking at legalizing them to be operating while the bike is in motion. They do not interfere with operator eyesight and will actually help in the reduction of bikers being 'T-Boned' at night with the extra lighting which will reduce Fatalities and Deaths. The bill increases visibility of motorcycles, especially at night." Unlike automobiles and light trucks which are required

lights which are visible from the side, motorcycle lights are often only visible from the front and rear and do not have the same illumination as automobiles. NHTSA published a report on the effectiveness of side marker lights on motor vehicles, concluding that side marker lights are a cost effective safety device which reduce the number of nighttime angular collisions that occur in the United States.

to have side marker lights or wrap around headlights / tail

A similar bill was recently signed into law in Texas, and Maryland, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and West Virginia have all passed similar legislation, while Missouri and Virginia are currently in the process of legalizing such lighting.

SPREADING MOTORCYCLE AWARENESS Nate Hudson, co-owner of "British-American Motorcycle Club", a bike shop in Long Beach, California, is currently in the middle of a 17,000-mile ride all over the U.S. to spread a motorcycle safety message for riders and awareness from car drivers. He visits the Department Of Motor Vehicles office in every state's capital, where he hand delivers a request that the authorities consider including motorcycle awareness in both the driver's license exam and the state's drivers' education curriculum.

Hudson's journey is being sponsored by Allstate Insurance Company, and he's riding a tricked out Indian Roadmaster donated by Indian Motorcycle painted in Allstate blue with logo and trim. So any photo of his bike, therefore, becomes a social-media ad for Allstate.

Posts and pictures about "The Ride Of Awareness" are published on social media channels, from Instagram to Twitter to Facebook, an efficient and credible user-generated content reaching online many more bikers than any television spot or print ad.

PAKISTANI POLICE EXEMPT FEMALE PAS-SENGERS FROM WEARING HELMETS Reacting to public protests over a traffic regulation in which it was made mandatory for motorcycle riders as well as pillions (passengers) to wear a helmet, including women, police in Karachi have announced exempting female pillion riders from wearing a helmet.

Inspector General (IG) Sindh Police, Ghulam Haider Jamali announced here on June 10 that the decision was made after the repeated appeals of citizens. In an earlier statement, the police said in case of riding pillion without helmets, both will be fined, regardless of whether the pillion is male or female.

The people took the decision with a violent reaction when it was made mandatory for women as well to wear a helmet as a passenger, and some citizens also contacted the court in this regard to exempt women from this sanction. But before the court could take any action, IG Police keeping in view a number of complaints, appeals and violent reaction by the public, immediately announced to withdraw its decision, so now following the announcement women are exempted from the restriction to wear a helmet as a pillion rider.

SURVEY REVEALS RIDERS' PET PEEVES In an online survey of motorcyclists conducted in June by Erie Insurance, nationwide respondents were asked to share their top five pet peeves about both other motorcycle riders and car drivers:

Top Five Complaints About Fellow Riders: #1: Riding Recklessly (ie: speeding, weaving through traffic, doing wheelies) - 56%; #2: Passing on the Shoulder - 41%; #3: Lane Splitting - 36%; #4: Wearing shorts, sandals, tank tops, etc - 35%; #5: Riders who don't wear helmets - 28%.

Top Five Complaints About Vehicle Drivers: #1: Drivers who don't check their blind spots before changing lanes -55%; #2: Texting while driving - 53%; #3: Reckless Driving (i.e., speeding, weaving in and out of traffic) - 50%; #4: Drivers who tailgate - 43%; #5: Not signaling when turning or changing lanes - 42%.
