Executive Director's Report by Dave Hastings, Executive Director

I have spent considerable time and effort writing articles for our Bailing Wire and hope you will take the time to examine and consider these articles. Although every article in our magazine is important and, hopefully, beneficial to our readers, several are just routine business that we discuss as an organization every month. I recently made the comment that one of the ways I wanted to improve our organization was to keep our members informed and up to date on our business.

ABATE *is* a business and as in any business some months just seem to require more of our time and energy to complete the tasks at hand than others. This month has been one of those.

Our organization is comprised of many diverse individuals with strong personalities full of independent, and often times polar opposite, views on many varied subjects. We succeed because of the common thread that sews all of our individual fabrics together and that thread is our motorcycles. I realize that I personally and this organization as a whole will never satisfy every individual members wants or needs and I accept that.

I have been on both the winning and losing side of numerous issues that ABATE has dealt with in my many years with this organization and I have never once given up hope on what our organization stands for or what it can actually accomplish for the riders of California. I still, to this day, believe we have made, and will continue to make, an important contribution and difference in California motorcycling. So what is all of this leading up to? ABATE is recognized as a legitimate and important grass roots player in the motorcycle rights fight in California and we are watched closely by other MROs and our ABATE counterparts in other states. California is a recognized leader in many areas and what happens here, good or bad, usually trickles out of our state and into the consciousness of the rest of the country. ABATE has always tried to work with other MROs in the past, usually to everyone's mutual benefit, but sometimes it feels like we did not benefit at all from an alliance simply because everyone could not reach a resolution in a timely manner.

Again, we *are* a business and not every endeavor that a business participates in will be a profitable one. We have had success and failure, but most importantly our success rate is high and our expectations are even higher. If a business is to succeed it must have credibility and honesty, maintain a solid bottom line, and keep its finger on the pulse of its industry.

ABATE of California has made a firm commitment to its members and the riders of California to monitor and protect their motorcycle lifestyle and rights and we have never lost sight of that vision and goal. With that said, this Board of Directors has promised to assume and fulfill its leadership role in California and the nation. We know we will never be able to satisfy everyone's wishes every time we vote on an item, but our first goal is to do the best we can for our ABATE members and, hopefully, every other rider in our state will then benefit also.

That is how we arrived at our decision to support AB 51, Assemblyman Quirk's lane splitting bill. Please take the time to read the information I have provided regarding this legislation in my other article, PAC Report, and then evaluate your position on the pending legislation.

Again, we have spent many hours examining and debating our ABATE position on this legislation and if any amendments are made that are not seen as beneficial to our motorcycle family we will immediately inform you, our valued members, and then reevaluate our support of the bill. This bill has flaws, but it does lay down a foundation to protect a valuable need for many of our California riders.

We, as an organization, will probably take some heat for our decision, but we cannot let this issue smolder any longer. Where there's smoke there's fire and if that fire becomes too big, we may lose the opportunity to control it. We've already gotten burned once by the helmet law, and we want to take control of this fire while we still have an opportunity to do so.

Please take some time to consider our thoughts on this legislation and "Thank You" for doing so.

The state Assembly elected Assemblyman Anthony Rendon as its Speaker, replacing our good friend and supporter, Speaker Emeritus Toni Atkins. She is running for Senate District 39 in San Diego. Speaker Rendon replaced some Committee Chairs, but left Assemblyman Jim Frazier as Chair of the Assembly Transportation Committee, naming another good friend of ABATE, Eric Linder, as its Vice Chair. It is expected that some other members will be replaced on various committees, as well.

The Budget Committees of both houses are

currently holding hearings to review Governor Brown's budget and they will continue until the June 15th deadline to pass a state budget. Meanwhile, policy committees will start hearing bills in late March until April 22nd, the last day for bills to pass out of their house of origin.

One bill of interest, introduced this session, is AB 1932 by Assemblyman Jay Obernolte (R-Hesperia) that will allow motorcyclists who receive a moving violation ticket and choose to take a drivers' education class in lieu of a point on their record to, instead, be able to take an advanced motorcycle training class approved by the Highway Patrol.

The bill is sponsored by Total Control Training in Victorville, the new California Motorcyclist Safety Program (CMSP) contractor. They have asked ABATE to be a Principal Co-sponsor of AB 1932.

Thanks, again, to all the individuals and Locals who contribute to the dedicated Lobbyist fund to keep me here, representing you, in the Capital.

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Pac/Treasurer's Report

The AB 51 legislation to codify, or put into law and officially legalize lane splitting or lane sharing (whichever term you prefer to call it), is

still idle and undergoing review by the author, Assemblyman Bill Quirk. ABATE, like everyone else, has heard rumors of possible amendments to this bill and we are still waiting for the final language to be released by the author.

The bill may be heard sometime in June of this year and we will then evaluate any possible changes to the bill and re-examine our support at that time.

We realize this is a controversial piece of legislation and ABATE will receive both strong support and strong disagreement from riders not only in California, but nationwide, for whatever position we finally endorse. At this time, California is the only state that allows riders to split lanes, and several other states are watching closely to introduce their own legislation based on the outcome here.

There are many who say "let this bill die and continue with the status quo" because they feel it is too restrictive. There are also many who say "officially legalize lane splitting now" before a bill can be introduced to outlaw it completely, as it is in every other state. Both sides have valid points and concerns and our ABATE PAC has



spent many hours examining the Berkeley Report and debating the issues and points raised by our members and fellow riders. Everyone, including the research team at Berkeley, agrees that lane splitting is safer, necessary, and advantageous to our riders and our air-cooled motorcycles.

The big dispute begins when mandatory speed limits are put into place and rider discretion and expertise are taken out of the subject. Motorcycle riding requires a highly dedicated skill set and a certain level of self determined and acceptable risk must be undertaken by the rider. So does operating a bicycle, automobile, truck, or any other mode of transportation. Many of those who do not want any restrictions on lane splitting and want to maintain the status quo are highly skilled riders and risk takers. Unfortunately, as the Berkeley Report reinforces, many of our riders are not, and that is where the problem arises, because the study determined speed and reaction times do make a difference.

Is this law fair to everyone? Absolutely not, but no law will ever be perfect because every law infringes on some of our ability to make a self-determined decision regarding our actions and our responsibilities to society and ourselves. On the flip side of this issue, there are many who want lane splitting outlawed completely in California and are working on a daily basis to make it happen.

ABATE realizes this bill is not perfect, in fact it's far from it, but it does codify and legalize something that we riders need and many of us use on a daily basis.

Remember that mandatory helmet law that everyone said would never pass in California? Well, after twenty four years, hundreds of court cases, and numerous attempts to repeal the law, we still have not regained our "freedom of choice" and we are still being forced to wear a helmet in California.

Let's not let lane splitting take us down the same road. If we codify lane splitting it will give us a legal foundation to work and improve upon. Codifying will immediately allow the CHP to educate the drivers of California on lane splitting and use enforcement when necessary to protect our riders from negligent and sometimes even aggressive drivers. Lastly, it will prohibit insurance companies from not honoring legitimate claims of accident and injury reimbursement incurred while we are practicing the 100% lawful act of lane splitting on the highways of California.

This law has more potential benefits for our riders than some may have realized and hopefully we can all accept its limitations and work to ensure we protect our right to continue to split traffic lanes in California.

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Tech Tips by Craig Griswold

Carburetors

Legend has it the first Harley-Davidson carburetor was made from a tomato can. None of my friends from that era are around anymore so my sources for a real fact check are limited, but if I had to take a SWAG, I would probably guess that the "prototype" may have involved a can, but the final product was most certainly a bit more sophisticated (not by much though). Fun fact: William Harley and Arthur Davidson had some help with their initial motorized bicycle design and first carburetor from Ole Evinrude, the outboard motor guy!

The fuel mixers have changed substantially since the days of the Silent Gray Fellow. Keihin's Constant Velocity (CV) carb was introduced with the 1988 models and remained until the 2007 model year, when all Harley-Davidson motorcycles were equipped with Electronic Fuel Injection. While fuel injection is now the rule, there are still plenty of carburetors out there. This next series will cover some carb basics as well as specific tuning procedures for a few of the most common carburetors.



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Carburetors operate on Bernoulli's Principle. In a nutshell, as air passes through a Venturi, it increases in speed with a corresponding reduction in pressure. This lower pressure will draw in fuel from the float bowl into the various circuits. You will hear the term *naturally aspirated* in performance circles and this is often confused with a distinction between fuel delivery systems. Aspiration has nothing to do with the system (carbureted or fuel injected). It refers to the induction. Forced (turbo or super charged) or natural.



There are three basic circuits in most carburetors. They are defined in function by their effect on the RPM range. Different manufacturers can use different terminology to identify these circuits. The first is the idle

or pilot circuit. This controls fuel delivery at idle and just off idle. The primary adjustment for tuning the idle circuit is the air/fuel mixture screw. Depending on design, opening the mixture screw will either add fuel or air during adjustment. We'll clear this up when we discuss tuning procedures. In most cases, at least one jet is used in conjunction with the a/f screw to regulate the idle circuit.

Next is the intermediate or mid-range circuit. This circuit runs the show just off idle to approximately 3000 RPM. As before, this range can vary depending on the carb. Just to make it clear as mud, some manufacturers use throttle position for tuning reference, some use RPM, and occasionally actual speed over ground is thrown in there. The intermediate circuit can utilize jets and or needles for fuel metering.

The third circuit is the main circuit. This controls delivery where the intermediate leaves off all the way to WFO. In most cases, the main is controlled by a jet.

Most modern carburetors also utilize an accelerator pump. This device provides a shot of fuel when the throttle is opened. The initial demand for fuel is usually greater when the throttle is opened fast. The idle circuit alone cannot provide enough fuel under this condition, and the engine will stumble and cough through the intake due to a lean condition.

Next month, we'll talk about the venerable S&S carburetors.

NCOM CONVENTION HONORS FALLEN RIDERS; INVITES NAMES

FOR TRIBUTE: With the 31st Annual NCOM Convention in Atlantic City just weeks away, the National Coalition of Motorcyclists is requesting that MROs, motorcycle clubs, and riding associations submit the names of those members and supporters who have died since May 2015, so that we may honor their memories during the traditional "Ringing of the Bell" tribute to fallen riders during the opening ceremonies. Dedications can be hand-delivered at the Convention to "Doc" Reichenbach, NCOM Chairman of the Board, or e-mailed in advance to Bill Bish at NCOMBish@aol.com.

Attendees are also encouraged to bring an item on behalf of their organization for the Freedom Fund Auction, with proceeds benefiting the motorcyclists' rights movement nationwide through Getting Our People Elected donations, NCOM Speaker Program, lobbying activities and other pro-motorcycling projects as determined by the NCOM Board of Directors.

The 31st annual NCOM Convention will be held Mother's Day weekend, May 5-8, 2016 at Harrah's Resort, located at 777 Harrah's Blvd in Atlantic City, New Jersey. This annual gathering will draw bikers' rights activists from across the country to discuss topics of concern to all riders, so reserve your room now for the special NCOM rate of \$109 by calling (888) 516-2215.

Registration fees for the NCOM Convention are \$80 including the Silver Spoke Awards Banquet on Saturday night, or \$45 for the Convention only. All motorcyclists are welcome and encouraged to attend. Meetings, seminars and group discussions will focus on legislative efforts and litigation techniques to benefit our right to ride and Freedom of the Road.

ANTI-PROFILING BILL HEARD IN MINNESOTA: A minority group claims its members are being unfairly profiled and stopped by police, and it's demanding a bill to prevent it. That group is motorcyclists, and the legislation, put before Min-



nesota's Senate Judiciary Committee by State Senator David Osmek (R-Mound), would require Minnesota's Board of Peace Officer Standards & Training to develop a statewide policy to eliminate motorcyclist profiling, including methods to identify and avoid it. SF1509 in the Senate, and companion bill HF59 in the House, would also require every law enforcement agency in the state to have "a written anti-motorcycle profiling policy."

In testimony, several members of Minnesota motorcycle clubs laid out a litany of their own experiences: Officers they believed had pulled them over on trumped-up pretenses questioned them about who they were and why they were in their community and, in some cases, photographed their tattoos & patches. "It's my constitutional right to be in a Motorcycle Club," said Jim Jahnke of Rochester, the National V.P. of the Sons of Silence MC.

Frank Ernst of Chanhassen, MN representing ABATE of Minnesota, and also chairman of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists - Legislative Task Force (NCOM-LTF), described an instance in which he said he was pulled over by an officer who claimed he hadn't seen Ernst's protective eye wear, which he was wearing, but Ernst didn't file an official complaint.

Sen. Osmek admitted the bill is based largely on anecdotal evidence, but told the state's Daily Globe newspaper that "I'm focusing on something that constituents brought to me that they had issue with," and he urges motorcyclists to file complaints and collect data on their own in order to make a stronger case.

Meanwhile, a motorcycle profiling bill is gaining momentum in Maryland, having passed the state Senate unanimously 47-0 on March 3 and now moves to the House, positioning Maryland to become the second state in the country behind Washington to pass such anti-discrimination legislation.

FEWER AMERICANS GETTING A DRIV-

ER'S LICENSE: It used to be a rite of passage into adulthood, but today fewer and fewer U.S. residents are lining up at their local DMV to get a driver's license, and new data indicates that all age groups are affected.

Analyzing decades of data from the Federal Highway Administration, a team from the University of Michigan's Transportation Research Institute found that since 2011, the number of U.S. citizens with drivers' licenses across all age groups, from 16 to 70, has decreased.

A recent University of Michigan report analyzed decades' worth of Federal Highway Administration records to show how licensure across all age groups has declined in the period stretching from 1983 to 2014.

Last year, nearly 77% of 20- to 24-yearold drivers held a license; in 1983, nearly 92% in that age bracket had one. Four years ago, the number was about 80%. For 16through 44-year-olds, there has been a continuous decline in the percentage of people with a driver's license.

The news may not be surprising for younger generations, who are more likely to use public transit or a ride-sharing company, or telecommute, but researchers also found a decline in the number of older adults with a driver's license.

Other reports have detected related trends, such as a decrease in the distance driven per person and less travel time overall, but even as the age of driverless cars approaches, a driver's license will continue to be mandatory for years to come.

WHITE HOUSE PUSHES DRIVER-LESS CARS: The Obama administration aims to remove hurdles to making autonomous cars more widespread, and the President's fiscal 2017 budget proposes spending \$4 Billion over the next decade to accelerate the integration of driverless cars on U.S. roadways.

The administration's multi-billion dollar proposal, which would require Congressional approval, calls on federal regulators to work with auto makers and others to craft policies and rules regarding autonomous vehicles and their development.

"We are going to do everything we can to advance safe, smart and sustainable transportation innovations," announced Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx at the Detroit Auto Show, "We are bullish on automated vehicles."

In addition to the new testing programs, Foxx also unveiled ambitious federal guidelines that he says will get self-driving on the roads quicker -- and more safely -- than ever thought possible. "(These actions) will provide the foundation and the path forward for manufacturers, state officials and consumers to use new technologies and achieve their full safety potential" he said.

Now, NHTSA will seek input from automakers and others as the auto agency tries to wrap its arms around the deployment and operation of fully self-driving cars as the norm, not an anomaly.

In addition, the agency plans to team up with state partners and the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators to develop a model driverless car policy states can implement, hopefully laying the groundwork for a consistent national policy.

CONGRESSIONAL RPM ACT WOULD PROTECT THE SPORT OF RACING: The federal Environmental Protection Agency

(EPA) is attempting to regulate racing by prohibiting the conversion of street motorcycles and automobiles into competitiononly racing vehicles, but newly-introduced legislation in Congress would prevent the EPA from impacting the lives of tens of thousands of armature and professional racers, their support teams and millions of race fans across the country.

Members of both chambers of Congress have introduced bipartisan versions of a bill that would protect the sport of racing by blocking the EPA from over-regulating the industry and ensuring that it remains legal to convert street legal motor vehicles for \$200 to \$2000 per incident. racing purposes.

The RPM Act (Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports Act of 2016); "A bill to exclude vehicles used solely for competition from certain provisions of the Clean Air Act" H.R.4715, was introduced March 7, 2016 in the House by U.S. Representative Patrick McHenry (R-NC) with 13 bipartisan co-sponsors, while companion measure S.2659 "to reaffirm that the EPA cannot regulate vehicles used solely for competition" was offered in the Senate on March 9 by Senator Richard Burr (R-NC) and three original co-sponsors.

H.R.4715 states, in part: "at the time the Clean Air Act was written, and each time the Clean Air Act has been amended, the intent of Congress has been, and continues to be, that vehicles manufactured for, modified for, or utilized in organized motorized racing events would not be encompassed by the Clean Air Act's definition of "motor vehicle".

The EPA recently re-opened the proposed regulation for more public comment. The regulation is scheduled for final approval this summer, so the time to act is NOW.

WISCONSIN BILL WOULD RESTRICT ACCESS TO BLACK BOX DATA: A bill that would require an owner's consent to access data in "black boxes" in cars and motorcycles seems more likely than ever before to come up for a vote in January 2017, according to members of ABATE of Wisconsin, a grassroots lobbyist group that deals with motorcycle issues but now finds itself leading the charge in fighting for privacy.

The bill covers not only Event Data Recorders or EDRs but any device that is recording any information or tracking user behavior. Anyone that took the information without consent faces potential fines ranging from

The bill says insurance companies would not be able to link the issuance or renewal of a liability policy to whether the vehicle has such a box, or whether the motorist allows the insurer to access or use data it collects.

Currently, the boxes record such data only in the seconds before, during and after a crash. But critics like ABATE, worry about how much more information the devices might collect as they become more sophisticated. ABATE says while the timing of the recordings may be limited now, safe guards need to be in place should that change.

At least 23 other states have passed laws defining who owns EDR data, according to Steve Panten, a spokesman for ABATE of Wisconsin, which supports the bill.

EX-COP SUES OVER MOTORCYCLE NOISE: A former Texas police officer is suing Arkansas officials over motorcycle noise. Rick Holtsclaw, a 31-year veteran of the Houston police department who placed an emphasis on noise enforcement, has sued city officials in Fort Smith and Fayetteville, Arkansas for their failure to enforce federal,

state, and local laws regarding motorcycle noise.

Holtsclaw's lawsuit cites the Noise Control Act of 1972 that makes it illegal for motorcycle exhausts to be altered or removed for the purpose of making noise. In addition, the Arkansas muffler statute requires every motor vehicle to be equipped with the quiet factoryinstalled muffler or a muffler duplicating the specifications of the factory-installed muffler.

Holtsclaw stated that "the law enforcement community in Arkansas has failed to intercede on behalf of the noise-beleaguered citizenry," particularly at rallies "where there are thousands of motorcyclists making illegally loud noise," and is seeking \$1,000,000 (one million) in damages from each municipality.

DRIVER WHO DELIBERATELY AS-SAULTED MOTORCYCLISTS STILL IN JAIL: A viral video showing a Texas driver who without provocation intentionally crashed into a motorcyclist last October, causing serious injuries to the rider and his passenger, has been languishing in jail unable to post bail since the incident.

William "Bill" Sam Crum was indicted by a Hood County grand jury on two aggravated assault counts carrying punishment of up to 20 years in prison and a fine up to \$10,000 and is currently being held on \$150,000 bail in Hood County Jail since his arrest October 20, 2015.

While motorcyclists can take comfort knowing that Mr. Crum has been in jail nearly 6 months awaiting trial on criminal charges, because he purposefully crashed into the victims, his auto insurance won't cover any civil judgment due to the intentional act exclusion in every policy.

Motorcycle Safety Report

The Guts of Riding

When we talk about or think about motorcycle safety we think of the obvious, accident prevention or motorcycle safety while riding. We also have a plethora of motorcycle safety schools and the barroom discussion platforms etc. There are many organizations and private operations that help us all as far as staying educated while riding, but I think there are many more chapters in motorcycle safety that we are not really exposed to or we just take it for granted and that all is well as long as I survived the day.

The motorcycle safety courses are out there and it's a country wide solution, and yes it's geared to how to handle your motorcycle and certain situations to avoid or how to react in case you are put into these situations that can save your life or escape injury. Most courses give you the standard training and they expect you to advance your knowledge on your own which is cool. I understand that almost every situation is different and the learning curve is as big as the number of riders out there. There is nothing better than experience on the road and sometimes it gets the best of us. That is the bad part of learning. For some it retires new riders and experienced riders as well, and for most of us we get knocked down and get back up. Then there is the elite, the ones who for the most part go thru life unscathed. It's not luck (we'd love to have it) or timing that saved us from some sort of freak accident, I like to think of it as skill and staying focused while riding, to have the ultimate confidence while riding!

I have seen the best of the best riders get killed and the dumb of dumbest riders ride for all their life, go figure... I have no regrets for this last statement but it's true in what I have noticed all my life and maybe yours as well. What I have learned is that we only have limited control and usually what's not in our control usually makes us a statistic, because, as we all say, stuff happens. What we do have is control of our body and mind, even though for a lot of us we have limited control due to aging and thus we medicate or change our lifestyles. When you get to a certain age you will know what I'm talking about, it's pure facts and sometimes it sucks big time!

I'm expanding this article from my last month's safety article, These Old Bones. I talked a little bit about the medical aspects of our bodies as riders, but I have come to realize that it's more than just the headlines shall we say. As far as getting to the 50 zone the spike in health concerns for us is: Eye Disease, Alzheimer's, Depression, Cardiovascular Issues, Bones and Joint Diseases, Prostrate, Diabetes, Cancer and many other issues, so many you can't count them because we are prone to multiple issues at one time and this includes, high blood pressure, cholesterol issues, obesity, arthritis and so on. I am not writing this to freak out people, getting old is a privilege and it is earned either the hard way and or the easy way, we are not a minority because we make up

almost one third of the world population and that's a great statistic to be a part of.

Getting to 60 for me is a milestone, especially as a rider. I am well aware of myself and my overall health condition; it is now a vital part of my gearing up to ride, true story! Because I have at least six of the above issues, I have to look at riding with a different attitude than 30 years ago, but I still love to ride! For some of us we ride to reduce the stress in our lives and medical reports suggest that stress can enhance a lot of medical issues that we have or are on the verge of having and they also state that stress could be the number one killer in men and woman in America. I have gone thru so many medical tests that I now can say I'm clean until something else happens. After losing three different body parts over the years and having two metal plates installed in my spine, I still love to ride! One of the biggest issues that I face because of age is diabetes. I know how it happened, but I said why me? After living high on the hog and not caring about my weight or what I ate, it just kicked my ass one day (actually it had started long before) and then the doctor told me if I didn't change my life I won't have a life to change, true story! He said most adults should start having blood work done after they hit 40 so you can map out your life and limit any future issues, because diabetes not only complicates all medical issues, diabetes alone can cause you to lose your vision, limbs and other vital organs as well, and this I discovered after a few operations.

And my proof to you is three years ago I had a metal plate put in my neck and my diabetes changed everything, it exploded! My spine in the neck area got infected and they had to do another emergency operation on my neck to clean out the infection and I had over four months of radical antibiotic treatment to kill the infection. It took me over three years to recover. I was down to zero and at my age I couldn't just jump back into it. My neck was okay, but my body and my mind were slow to recover.

I now know how important it is to share this because we all are subjected to some kind of illness/disease and the best thing you can do for it is to become aware of your body and mind. You need to start taking care of your guts! We do this for our motorcycles, cars, houses and whatever, but we kind of put our health on the back burner, it's a fact! It's not a macho thing or it will never happen to me kind of thing. The fact is as we age and our guts wear out, we must go that extra mile sometimes just so we can ride. If I didn't change my life, as per regular check-ups, taking the proper medications and being on a vitamin/herbal kick I wouldn't be riding today and that would really bother me. Staying healthy is a vital part of motorcycle safety! I am looking forward to riding this year because it's the first year in a while that I started riding in January and I can't wait for summer!
